

ASHA Youth Photo Contest

ASHA also recognizes the artistic side of our junior members through our annual ASHA Youth Photo Contest. Photographs of a living American Saddlebred horse are to be taken by an ASHA junior member. (Sorry, no model horses!) You may submit as many photographs as you like, and awards are given in two age divisions, 13 & under and 14-20. So, ready, get set, shoot! Send in your photo before November 30. Contact Brenda Newell for your entry form by e-mailing b.newell@asha.net.

Rules

All entrants must be ASHA junior members age 20 years or under by November 30.

Photographs must be the entrant's own work and must be taken by the youth member, not an adult. All photographs must be of a living American Saddlebred horse.

Entries will not be returned. They will become the property of ASHA and may be reproduced in any manner by ASHA for publication, promotion, display, or distribution.

All photos must be 8×10 , unmatted and unframed. All digital images should be submitted on disk or e-mailed to b.newell@asha.net. Please indicate in the subject line: Photo Contest Entry. Digital entries must be sized to approximately $8'' \times 10''$ and saved in .jpg format at medium compression with a resolution of 300 dpi.

You may submit as many photos as you like; however, a separate entry form must be taped to the back of each photo or included with disk or e-mail. Only one entry per contestant will be awarded a prize.

Photos will be judged on creativity, originality and quality of photography. Judging will take place at ASHA, and winners will be notified no later than December 31. No entry fee.

Two age divisions, 13 & under and 14-20.

Photo may include individuals as well as other props. If photo includes a person(s), that person(s) must give written consent and sign waiver on entry form.



Partcipants keep track of the time they spend riding. Owning a horse is not a requirement to participate. Special Saddle Time awards will be given when you complete various hour levels. For example, riders will receive a patch and a lapel pin once 50 hours of riding has been completed; a patch and shirt when after 150 hours; a patch and a tote bag when once 200 hours is completed; and additional gifts and recognition as Saddle Time hours accumulate. Hours count in the following activities: trail riding, lessons, parades, drill team and non-USEF recognized events and shows (a 4-H show is a good example).

Saddle Time Rules

Must be a current and active member of ASHA. Levels one through three do not have to be accumulated on American Saddlebreds.

Levels four through six must be earned on registered American Saddlebreds.

Time recorded begins upon ASHA's receipt of enrollment ¶ fee. There is no time limit as long as membership stays active.
 ↓ Hours are recorded on the official hours log report by the honor system. Hours required for each award are cumulative.

• Ownership of horse is not required.

Hours will count in the following activities: trail riding, lessons, parades, drill teams and non-recognized events/shows. Hours will not count in the following activities: USEF recognized events/shows, competitive trail rides, endurance rides, driving, grooming and hot walking.

What types of activities were completed in order to earn your hours?





The ASHA Junior Exhibitor Driving Challenge, funded by Elisabeth Goth, was developed to promote the American Saddlebred driving divisions among junior exhibitors. Competitors 17 years of age and under are adding driving to their horsemanship portfolios as horse shows add Driving Challenge classes to their class list. This program was designed with the intention of promoting both good sportsmanship and driving skills with ASHA youth members. All horses winning a ribbon in two official qualifying classes in their division are eligible to compete at the finals. Custom trophies and ribbons are offered in qualifying events, with \$10,000 in cash and prizes available at the finals.

Rules for Eligibility:

Horse must be a ribbon winner (ANY placing) in two official qualifying classes in the same division to be eligible to compete in that respective division of the Finals, i.e., a horse must compete in two Country Pleasure qualifying classes to be eligible to compete in the Country Pleasure Driving Challenge Final.

Different drivers may show the same horse in the qualifying classes, and one driver may qualify different horses; however, one of those drivers who qualified the horse must show the horse in the final.

A first place win does not eliminate a driver from other Driving Challenge classes during that qualifying period.

The winner of a final is not eliminated from further competition.

ASHA reserves the right to make changes or decisions regarding this program.

Girl Scouts get CRAZY 'BOUT HORSES at the Colorado Classic Horse Show

Girl Scouts of Colorado partnered once again with the Colorado Classic Horse Show to offer the 8th annual Crazy 'Bout Horses event on April 5th, 2014 at the National Western Events Center in Denver, Colorado. Nearly 150 Girl Scouts, ages 10-12, registered for the event and attended the 38th annual Colorado Classic Horse Show to learn about horse health, horse care and the horse show industry.

The Girl Scouts watched the horse show to learn about the Saddlebred, Morgan and Arabian breeds. After the show, the girls rotated through 10 educational stations with topics such as: horse behavior, horse health, safety around horses, grooming, horse shoeing, veterinary care, adopting wild mustangs, barn tours and a horse trivia game.

Kicking off the event, professional horse trainer Anne Judge-Wegener, rider of Thunder the Denver Broncos mascot, signed autographed photos and gave them to the Girl Scouts as she answered questions about riding Thunder at the Broncos games.

Presenter and trainer Nancy Goodwin from Finesse Farms from Erie, Colorado gave useful tips on safety around horses so that Girl Scouts could be prepared for future horse encounters. With the help of American Saddlebred gelding "I'm Hot, You're Not," Nancy showed Girl Scouts how to safely work around horses and proper safety equipment such as helmets and boots. But

most popular with the girls was how to properly feed a horse a carrot.

At the veterinary station, veterinarian Scott Martell from Town & Country Clinic in Platteville, Colorado, explained to the Girl Scouts what a day in the life of a veterinarian looks like and how to become a vet. Girl Scouts asked interesting questions about how horses breathe, and what you need to do if a horse gets colic.

New this year to Crazy 'Bout Horses was the Formative Haptics station where Girl Scouts used clay to attach tendons and ligaments to a model horse leg. This activity gave the girls a better understanding of how a horse's leg works and the difference between tendons, ligaments and muscles.

"I learned that a horse's front leg is more like a human arm and a horse's back leg is more like our legs," said Adrienne, 10, from Troop 4642 from Aurora, Colorado. "Horses are just so interesting and beautiful!"

"I love to ride horses, and they let you ride them," said McKenzie, 9, from Troop 4642, from Aurora, Colorado. "Compared to other pets, you can do so much with them. They are very capable and I love them."

A perennial favorite is the grooming station where troops get hands-on experience brushing a very furry white Shetland pony named Godzilla belonging to David and Cindy Vogels of Andover Farm.

"I love to pet horses," said Sammy, 8, from Troop 4559, from Broomfield, Colorado. "They are so soft and gentle."

Farrier Del Slaugh fired up his forge to show the Girl Scouts how he can transform a straight piece of steel into a fully functional horse show. Heating the steel up to an astonishing 2,200 degrees Fahrenheit, Del shaped the red hot metal into a horse shoe shape, added a Fullering groove and nail holes. To the delight of the girls, each group got to take home a lucky horse shoe from the demonstration.

Breaking away from the main arena, Girl Scouts got a behind-the-scenes look at the horse show through a guided barn tour. The girls could see horses getting bathed and prepped for the show and could meet the horse trainers in person. The highlight of the tour was meeting the

American Saddlebred Horse "Sharky" who starred in the American Girl Dolls book and movie "Saige Paints the Sky."

"This is my first experience being around horses," said Tabitha, 10, from Troop 64257 from Aurora, Colorado.


I really love horses and how some of them are so big and some are so small. I want to own a horse someday!

"Horses are hard to ride because they can get scared easily," said Cora, 10, from Troop 2551 from Aurora, Colorado. "But I love horses and how they take care of you."

Cora and Tabitha learned about horse behavior and spent a long time petting a very soft and gentle Arabian mare named "Maid Marion." After the event, girls could continue their education with a special take-home notebook filled with horse facts, fun activities and equine industry contact information. Girls could also win Breyer model horses at a special raffle.




