Filing the declaratory judgment suit was an attempt to get the question of what was appropriate for viewing out of the office of the Association and into the court for interpretation. The court ruled that the language in the Kentucky law went beyond financial records, minutes and membership lists. The Association has appealed this decision, and the anoeal is still pending. The Board did. however, vote not to pursue its request to stay the enforcement of the judgment pending this appeal, believing that it was in the best interests of the Association to allow review of

the documents that had been requested in the linguistion. There have been passionate feelings on both sides of this dispute, but it's time to end the earing, down and move forward with registering and promoting the American Saddlebred. At many times during this process the focus of the dispute has turned far away from the issues at hand and became personal attacks on those who have volunteered their time and resources to serve this breds. 2011 Art Auction a Success at the Museum

The American Saddlebred Museum's new Gallery Wing proved to be the perfect setting for the annual Art, Antique and Rare Book Auction.

Approximately 175 art and Saddlebred history aficionados were on hand for this first on-site Museum auction. Sixty-six lots of artwork, books, collectibles memorabilia and furniture

were offered for sale. The sale topper was the beautiful George Ford Morris oil of Julius

Fleishmann on his white polo pony, which garnered \$20,000. The second highest-selling item was the gorgeous George Ford Morris charcoal drawing entitled "The Stallion," which brought \$7,000. Drawing in New Business and Promoting the Breed through Daily Deal Sites: A Winning Combination

Groupon and Living Social have sprung to popularity in what seems like no time at all. Thousands of businesses are using these sites to showcase their company and draw in new clients. When hearing the names, Groupon and Living Social, your mind might immediately jump to the idea of deals for restaurants and spa treatments, but some American Saddlebred farms have found that these sites can boost business and breed promotion in an incredible way.

Currently the leaders in the "daily deal market," Groupon and Living Social appressively advertise their sites through email, the web, and even via television spots, People then sign up for email alerts from the sites, which leads to daily deal alerts, sent directly from the "social couponing," or daily deal sites. The daily deals offer great discounts, often 50% off or more. Usually people have a limited time of 24 hours to claim the deal, and sometimes only a limited number of the deals are offered.

Randy Cates of Cross Creek Stables in Edmund. Oklahoma, had even greater success, as 430 people bought his \$10 introductory riding lesson, which is normally \$19,95. Of those 430 people, all but one family was completely new to American Saddlebred Horses.

Cates learned about Groupon from a television news show. and then had his lesson instructor contact them. Groupon told her that several horse operations had already run deals. with good response.

"We signed up for the 24 hour deal, but you can do it a whole bunch of different ways, sell a limited number or unlimited, we chose the unlimited, but stopped the deal when we got up to 430 sold. Groupon will tell you about a third of your people will follow through, which is what we're seeing. We plan on doing it again this fall as a backto-school promotion. They say the second time you run the same ad, you get less people, so we will only run it twice a vear," said Cates.

Cates made sure to emphasize that the demographic that bought the Groupon was across the board, "Rich people use coupons too," he said, explaining that thinking that wealthy people do not use coupons is a stigma that people need to get past. Cates was extremely pleased with his Groupon

experience, saying that there is not really a downside to it. Holly Fisher of Ramblewood Farm in Bellbrook, Ohio, posted her Groupon for a two private lesson package deal. hoping for 30 or 40 to be purchased. Her expectations were far succeeded when they sold 137,

Fisher's sister, Katie Singleton thought about running a

Groupon, they may have never gone out looking for a barn to ride at," said Fisher, Of the Ramblewood Farm Groupons that have been redeemed so far, 100% of

the people have been new to Saddlebreds. Fisher was surprised by the results. "So far only two women have come

in with previous experience, the rest have been complete beginners. We thought that it would mostly be lessons for children, but at least half of the Groupons purchased have been for adult riders," said Fisher.

Fisher was very satisfied with her experience with Groupon, and it has even led to more promotional opportunities for her Ramblewood Farm.

"We never dreamed we would sell what we did...Living Social contacted me the week after we ran our Groupon deal and asked if we would run two deals with them. We are running a similar two lesson deal as well as a discount on our pony birthday parties in September, In addition to that, I was contacted by a local radio station to come in and inter view with the morning show, They will give away some riding lessons as prizes on the radio, as well as sell half price gift certificates," said Fisher.

Zubrod Stables of Prospect, Kentucky, ran a deal through Living Social coinciding with the Derby season events in Louisville, with their deal running from April 25-May 1. At print time, of the 78 sold, 15 customers had redeemed their coupons.

Most of the people coming in with their Living Social coupons were new to Saddle Seat, having little experience beyond trail riding at camps, if any at all, Some however, did have Saddle Seat riding experience from various Saddlebred barns in the Louisville area, including one

rider who grew up riding and showing Saddlebreds, but has been out of the industry for several years.

Beyond the promotion, Deveau Zubrod Kreitzer, of Zubrod Stables has been impressed with the

number of purchasers who have continued to take lessons "Our of the coupons that have

been redeemed so far, only one did not schedule a third lesson with us. Probably two to three customers continued with five plus lessons and then decided to take a break because of their summer schedule/vacations/etc. The others are all continuing to take weekly lessons." said Kreitzer.

When Kent Swalla, owner and trainer, and Brittany Logan, riding instructor at Glendale Stables in Columbia, Missouri, wanted to bring in new lesson students and potential customers, as well as promote the American Saddlebred breed, they chose to run a promotion with Groupon. Just like the other barns, most of their Groupon redeemers had never ridden before, and all of them were completely new to Saddlebreds and Saddle Seat, Logan could not have been happier with her experience with Groupon, where 134 of the promotions

were purchased. "I have been lucky enough to have about 15 people stick with it after their two lessons were over with. From the Groupon customers we have had about five or so that have brought in friends that have now started taking lessons. It is a great advertising tool, it is free to do, and it doesn't put you or the program out any money," said Logan. So what's the catch? When you post a deal on Groupon, you split the price of the deal with the company. Therefore, if you are offering a riding lesson for \$20, you get \$10 and Groupon gets \$10. Living Social works a bit differently, by

taking a commission percentage instead. As Cates said, about a third of the people who buy the coupon will actually redeem it. Even though they may not use their lesson, however, that lesson has already been paid for at the discounted

rate when they bought it. All four barns were excited about the number of lessons their social couponing deals brought in, but they also stress the fact that it is important to take that extra amount of redeemed lessons into account in your current schedule.

"My only advice to any barns wanting to do a similar deal is to be organized. We were well prepared with a schedule spreadsheet so that when the calls starting coming in, I could easily schedule them right away with either myself or my other instructor," said Fisher.

The barns also agreed that it is important to read and re-read the descriptions of the social coupons.

"The [Living Social] creative team writes the copy for the deal, and I went through and edited it quite a bit, so it didn't sound like they would come out to the barn and learn how to gallop through the fields and race like a jockey! I tried to keep it informative for what we offer. Also I think it was important to us to be very clear in the details and fine print, so we would only be getting new customers, and that people weren't purchasing five different coupons for the same person," said Kreitzer.

The social couponing sites really do seem to be winners from a breed promotion standpoint, as well as a lesson program building standpoint. The exposure these sites give the breed is hard to replicate, and the chance to draw in many new clients and future American Saddlebred lovers is hard to pass up.

My only advice ... is to be organized. We were well prepared with a schedule spreadsheet so that when the calls starting coming in. I could easily schedule

them right away with either myself or my other instructor."







HOW THE SHOW BEGAN ...

In 1936, the ladies of the Junior League of Lexington were giving teas, having chain bridge parties, holding folly performances ... doing just about anything that was both tasteful and legal to make a nickel to support their community work programs during the depression.

Most of these fundraisers only made about \$900 which didn't go very far in a time when people where in such desperate need of help.

The league president at the time, Mrs. Jame Bi, (Mariy Kittrell), got in her mind there had to be a better way to make money, She thought a how, to make money, She thought a how, to make money, She thought a how, show would be the perfect fit for the Horse Capital of the World. The operating budget was only \$500 and the rest was up to the league members' hard work. The show opened July 22, 1937 with a crowd of 24,000 people, \$10,000 in prize money and 216 horses from 16 states.

After all the bills were paid, everyone was shocked to learn they made roughly around \$5,500 on the first show. With unanimous approval of the members, the League decided to host a second Show the next year. The tradition was born!

Now, 75 years later, the Lexington Junior League Horse Show is still a prestigious event with regular attendance of around 30,000 people each year and attracts nationally renowned competitors

In fact, the Lexington Junior League Charity Horse Show is the largest ourdoor show for the American Saddlebred in the world. The Show has the honor of being the first leg of the Saddlebred Triple Crown, has generated millions of dollars for charitable and civic organizations in Central Kentucky, and has had an impressive yearly economic impact for our local community.

We thank all our local business and individual citizens for sponsoring our show over the years.


