

- Each must contain the sine and dam of each horse advertised.
- 3. Only purebred American Saddlebreds may be advertised.
- 4. For historical purposes, altered images (whether digitally or otherwise) that have changed the motion, conformation or way of going of the horse will be refused.

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Three Projects Shining a Light on the American Saddlebred

Three projects this summer have proved to be very successful tools in marketing our breed outside our own world.

BLAZE MAGAZINE is a one of a kind discovery magazine for kids who love horses. The target audience is 8

to 14 years and the magazine says it is for "Horse-Crazy Kids." In the issue that was published in August, the American Saddlebred horse was featured, complete with trivia questions and a centerfold that pictured CHSprinkles. On the cover the headline "Personality PLUS," The American Saddlebred offers the reader a glance into what is inside the magazine.

Now in its fifth year, Blaze combines the mix of entertainment and education that kids look for in magazines and websites. Kids want creativity and challenges, and they want to have fun. That's the Blaze difference — it is an interactive magazine that keeps the fun in horses and learning.

Magazines like Blaze (blazekids.com) have a big presence both on the news stand — and probably more importantly — on the internet. One can only

imagine the look on a child's face when they open up the magazine and there is their spotted dream horse in the centerfold!

EQUESTRI-AN LIFE and the Learn to Ride and Drive in Style promotion has been an outstanding success. With over 3,000 viewers on the

Equestrian Life website of the video "What is an American Saddlebred," with the other videos getting their fair share of viewers, this is marketing our breed to horse lovers outside our immediate family. The "What is

an American Saddlebred" video was viewed over 6,000 times on the ASHALive/USEF Network.

The Equestrian Life project is one that keeps on giving, because these videos can be used at your Charter Club activities, horse shows, Equine Affaire booths, barn open houses - let your imagination take you to the countless ways these excellent and well

produced videos can be used to tell the world about our breed.

If you have not visited the Equestrian Life website, use the link on the front page of the ASHA website and enjoy the short and informative videos, and tell your friends and neighbors to do the same. Remember, enthusiasm builds when you pass it on!

ASHALive/Network: For the first time this year, ASHA offered a free web-3N to RIDE & cast of the World's


Championship Horse Show using the USEF Network.

> Last year was the first to be with the USEF Network and the response has been remarkable. In 2010, there were 10,684 plays on the live

player, and in 2011 there were 58,766.

As I write this President's Message in the

middle of September, the ASHALive page on the USEF Network has enjoyed 63,747 video plays, which means the Video On Demand has been played 4,117 times since August 29.



Saddlebreds were highlighted in Blaze Magazine's August issue.

"What Is a Saddlebred" has been viewed 6,231 times, the World's Grand Championship Five-Gaited class has been viewed 1,766 times, and the World's Champion of Champion Ladies Three-Gaited class is next in popularity with 1,640 plays.

Interestingly enough, the 2010 World's Grand Championship Five-Gaited class has been viewed 783 times since August 21, 2011.

The ASHALive page has had 115,242 views, and that number is growing day by day. It rivals the Rolex Three-Day event in viewership!

For too long we have kept the light of the American Saddlebred dimmed. When we let that light shine, as we have done with the programs outlined above, our breed consistently sells itself. Is there a downside to this type of effort? Only if we do not remember that when you shine the light, it not only highlights the good features, it exposes flaws. But flaws can be corrected, and the effort to think outside the box and get our breed in front of the horse-buying and horse-loving public is an effort that must be continued. The light needs to become a beacon!







Help Needed to Complete the Archives Project

In November 2008, Museum supporters Gail Kline and Ellen Lifson each generously donated \$1,200 to fund a project to digitize and organize the Museum's archives. Those funds allowed us to hire part-time interns to begin the arduous task of carefully organizing, cleaning and photographing the thousands of items contained in our archive area. Through judicious use of these interns' time, we were able to stretch those funds out over the past three years. There is light at the end of the tunnel, but we still have over one third of the items left to process.

So that we may keep our current intern moving ahead with this project, we are asking for a donor or donors to make a contribution earmarked for the Archives Project. Two wonderful people stepped up the last time we asked and we are hoping more will do the same now. We have so







Harold Morgeson

Longtime President of the Rock Creek Riding Club, Harold Morgeson, of Louisville, Kentucky, passed away on Friday August 19 at the age of 92.

Morgeson was born on a farm in Bradfordsville, Kentucky and never forgot where he came from. After high school he went to work for the familyowned Henry Vogt Machine Company, where he worked until his retirement in 1988. He advanced through the ranks of Vogt and was promoted to Vice President.

He loved horses and was President of the Rock Creek Riding Club for 17 years. He was awarded the title President Emeritus and ultimately inducted into the Rock Creek Hall of Fame.

Known as the "Mayor of Rock Creek," not only was Morgeson the longest serving president in the history of the club, he also served as horse show chairman, who, along with legendary horse show manager Herman Miles, elevated the status of the Rock Creek Horse Show, which earned the show

of the Year awards. He might be best known as the best-dressed tractor driver in America... who can forget his signature straw hat and suit? He was also instrumental in helping the club rebuild and survive after a devastating fire in 1996.

Cornelia Atherton Serpell was born March 7, 1917 to Cornelia A. Atherton and Peter Lee Atherton in Glenview, Kentucky and passed

away on September 10, 2011.

Preceding her in eternal life are her parents; her sister, Sarah Atherton, and brother, John M. Atherton.

Those who remain to honor her and cherish her memory forever are her daughter, Cornelia Yankovich (Robert), four nephews, and a host of friends.

In addition to having owned several quality show horses, Serpell served as the American Horse Shows Association Steward at the Kentucky State Fair World's Championship Horse Show for many years, and had also served as a judge at the show. In 2003, she was inducted into the World's Championship Horse Show Hall of Fame.

Serpell was also an ardent and dedicated supporter of the Rock Creek Horse Show for over 50 years, serving as a judge, steward, and exhibitor. She was known as a very fair and honest judge, who treated everyone well. Serpell was always concerned for others and could always be depended on to get

things done, but never for personal recognition. She might be best known for her work outside of the horse world, as she was the most single influential person in the history of Kentucky's mental health advocacy.

pion of many causes related to health and the well being of those challenged with mental health issues. Her work included: Children's Clinics in Eastern Kentucky, where she and a registered nurse rode on horseback to transport patients; Psychiatric In-Patient and Child Guidance Clinics; was Public Relations Director and Coordinator of Patient Rehabilitation for Central State Hospital; chaired fund-raising for the first mobile cancer unit in Kentucky; collaborated in establishing the Kentucky Association for Mental Health; organized statewide mental health committees.

Serpell served on numerous boards and councils, including: Wellspring, Visiting Nurses Association, Council for Health Services; Kentucky Advisory Council for Mental Health, Commission on Aging, State Board of Medical Licensure, Kentucky Legislature Ethics Commission. She was the recipient of the first Distinguished Alumna Award from Louisville Collegiate School; also she received the Health Kentucky — Service to Humanity Award, the Kilgore Good Samaritan Award, and the President's Award for the Kentucky Association of Health Care Facilities.

She was a strong force in improving the lives of those who were in need; she lifted them and gave them a chance. She was courageous and steadfast in all facets of her life, and will always remain a beacon of light and an inspiration.

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HORSE COLOR A Black and White Issue

The American Saddlebred Registry (ASR) is striving to make the color identifying process during registration as easy as possible. Although it is may seem easy to identify a horse's color, the Registry has found a gray area.

Currently there are many different colors registered in the ASR. While identifying the typical colors in a generic fashion of bay, black, and chestnut may be easy, the more unusual colors are sometimes hard to identify. For example, gray horses are often born black or chestnut, but with age they develop into gray.

So how can you know for sure?

With the help of the University of
Kentucky's equine color expert, Dr.
Kathryn Graves, we are able to help. To
begin, Dr. Graves explains that color
variants are caused by mutations in different genes, which are involved in pigment production or transport, and that
mutations can be expressed in a dominant or a recessive manner. Because colors are genetic, they can be proven
through DNA based tests that directly
detect the causative mutation.

These tests are \$40 each and require a sample of the horse's hair. Unfortunately some colors need more tests. Why? Dr. Graves explained that this is because a different gene controls each aspect of the color, or different genes can have similar effects on the color, such as the dilution mutations. For example, both a palomino horse and a golden champagne horse will test as a chestnut with the E locus or "red gene" test, but these two dilute colors can be accurately distinguished from one another through the Cream Dilution and Champagne Dilution tests, respectively.

These tests can be very important, especially if your horse is actually a horse of a different color. Accurately identifying a horse's color is important for many reasons. Dr. Graves noted that, "Since color genotypes are inherited just like the DNA markers used in parentage, they can be used to support or refute the parentage of a horse. If someone misidentifies a color when registering a foal, that can create a problem down the line. For example, a gold champagne incorrectly registered as a palomino may cause a problem if it produces an amber champagne instead of the expected buckskin."

Another relevant issue with color is in a rescue scenario. When organizations such as Saddlebred Rescue save an unidentified American Saddlebred, color could make or break the identifying process. For example, if they rescue a gray Saddlebred, but it was registered as a foal as chestnut or black, they may have a very difficult time identifying the horse through searching the registry online.

While the color tests are not mandatory, they can be very useful in correctly identifying a horse's color. Another tool that can be helpful to the registry for both color identifying and historical purposes is to send in a photo with your registration papers. While not necessarily required for every horse, it is strongly recommended that photos be submitted with all Applications for Registration. In some cases, however, photos are required. For example, for any horse with white markings above the knees or hocks (such as pintos), four current photographs, showing both sides, front and rear, must accompany the Application for Registration. While photos are optional in some instances, they are useful, and will be kept in the horse's file.

Another resource ASR is working on is the color brochure. The color brochure will be a pamphlet with pictures and descriptions of all possible colors of American Saddlebreds. Breeders can use this pamphlet to compare their horse's color to those in the brochure, to aid in the correct color identification. ASR plans to produce this brochure in the near future.

The webcast from the Kentucky State Fair World's Championship Horse Show this year was a resounding success, and we would like to share some numbers that shed some light on the statistics themselves. As far as raw stats go, we would like to present some numbers from the live player. Please keep in mind these figures come from the week of the event itself, and only include the webcast player:

- The webcast was played 58,766 times.
- The average viewing time was 58 minutes, which is an extremely high average for an online video.
- We delivered 56,803 hours to viewers throughout the week.

These numbers, in comparison to previous years, are remarkably high. We saw a 450% increase in year-to-year online video attendance. This is due largely to the fact that the stream was offered free of charge this year, but also due to our constant pursuit of the highest quality and available features. On the webcast portal this year we presented live results during the show, news from the event, photos from around the fair grounds, and more.

The quality of this year's futurity entries had to make the American Saddlebred world proud, as the babies snorted and waved their tails down the straightaway, and the performance horses marched through Freedom Hall. Although not all the classes could be considered filled, each class was filled with the extreme quality and charisma that makes Saddlebreds, Saddlebreds.

Last year there was a dominant sire among the futurity winners in Undulata's Nutcracker, who sired five of the ten winners. This year, Nutcracker was again the leading sire of the futurity winners, siring two of the World's Champions.

(SA) Tornaado was the leading broodmare sire this year, also siring two of the World's Champions. Bobese, Walterway's Wild & Wooly, and Kinex scored their first World's Champion get from the field of this year's futurity winners. Northern Vegas found his second World's Champion in the futurity classes, while Deep Blue, Revival, Belle Reve's Renaissance Man, and Sir William Robert all added to their impressive list of progeny.

New bloodlines and old bloodlines both found futurity winners, many of those combining both. The futurity blues also found some South African blood, which is becoming increasingly common in the show horse bloodlines today. No matter the bloodlines, each individual was exceptional in talent, enthusiasm, and conformation, all of which are imperative to excelling on the world stage.

KENTUCKY FUTURITY WEANLING • LISMORE'S NUTTIN BETTER 148999

For the third year in a row, it was a Joan Lurie trained entry to win the Kentucky Futurity Weanling class. Lurie's weanling winning extends further though, since for the last six years she has had a weanling winner at the show.

Lismore's Nuttin Better is bred by Terri Kearney and owned by Swanson and Jampsa LLC, who also own Undulata's Nutcracker, the sire of this animated filly who won the class unanimously.

Her sire's lineage is full of storied champions, as Nutcracker's dam, Christmas In New York ERB is a full sister to World's Champion That's My Story, a reserve world's champion producer herself.

Christmas In New York has Oman's Desdemona Denmark on both sides of her pedigree as well as a heavy dose of Supreme Sultan, who is known to bring beauty and refinement to all his get. Supreme Sultan and Desdemona Denmark are also seen through Nuttin Better's dam side.

Out of Valhalla's Razzle Dazzle who is by Radiant Sultan and out of the Talent Town mare, Mousse Au Chocolat, Lismore's Nuttin Better is the first of three foals of Razzle Dazzle's to show.

What a first foal to show though, as Nuttin Better finished out the week by being crowned Reserve World's Champion in the ASR Kentucky Futurity Amateur Weanling class with owner, David Jampsa.



Bono was her next World's Champion, winning at Louisville as a young horse with Bret Day, and later with Linda Fischer Wheeler in the Amateur Ladies Five-Gaited division.





Dr. Robert "Chip" Pugh is a man who knows what he wants when he sees it. "I fell in love with Wild Carrissima when I saw Jimmy Stachowski drive him at Rock Creek," he says. The owner and exhibitor has been in the American Saddlebred industry for the better part of thirty years, but the big bay fine harness horse caught his eye like no other horse ever has. "The first time I spotted him I practically drooled. I had to have him."

That's the exact opposite reaction that Shawn Stachowski had when she first set eyes on the young colt that was to eventually earn a World's Grand Championship. "I knew the lady that had Wild Carrissima as Sam Lopez. She ran a 4-H club in Ohio and kept some horses at her farm. When Brian Rose Farm dispersed a bunch of incredibly bred broodmares, some of them went to Sam." That farm housed the mare Mia Carrissima for some time before a client of Ms. Stachowski's purchased the mare, inspiring Stachowski to go take a look at the remaining horses that Ms. Lopez had for sale.

When she arrived at the farm, it had seen better years, but even so, says Ms. Stachowski, "I felt like I was walking into history."

The Lopez farm was the former showplace stable Glen Grove Farm, then owned by Mr. and Mrs. Elliot Bonnie Jr., where historical Saddlebreds like Vanity's Vanguard and Buck Creek's Precious Princess had their beginnings. Even so, when she saw Wild Carrissima in the stall, "I really didn't want him. He is not a 'stall horse." Ms. Stachowski left without a purchase that day, but later, she says, "Somehow she talked me into coming back. Sam told me,

'If there's any horse on the property that is going to go far, it's this one.' So this ugly duckling, rank colt comes out of the stall, and she took him out into her courtyard, and then he started bouncing around." It took only seconds for Ms. Stachowski to recognize the raw natural talent before her. "He is so extremely gifted, a total handful, and a real athlete. He's full of himself, but he's not stupid acting at all.

He's the most horse I've ever dealt with but at the same time, he's really very smart and trainable," she says of the horse that she purchased that day for about a thousand dollars.

"I picked the colt up myself, and I don't think I told my husband — James Stachowski — about it. It was sort of like going to the mall and stuffing the shopping bags in the trunk so your husband can't see, only it was with a trailer."

Of course, it's a bit tougher to be stealthy with a truck and trailer, and a horse instead of shopping bags, and when Ms. Stachowski got home, she had some 'splainin' to do. When her husband, a revered trainer in the industry, saw the rough colt step off the trailer, his disapproving statement to his wife that day was, "You know I only deal in high dollar horses."

It's a safe bet to say that Mr. Stachowski no longer doubts his wife's selection of show prospects today.

It's the sort of wonderful, humble beginning that we all love to hear, especially when the ending could have been unremarkable. "He could have easily been lost to the show ring," Shawn Stachowski points out realistically.

Other people beside Ms. Stachowski recognized the potential in the spirited animal, including Brian Cutting, who worked for the Stachowskis breaking horses for the better part of 15 years. "Brian started Wild Carrissima," says Ms. Stachowski of the horse that she named. "He really believed in him and loved him immediately."

A careful and thorough beginning to his training led to a strong beginning in the show ring, including a reserve in the Stallion/Gelding Fine Harness stake last year in only the horse's second harness class. "Willy is a horse that is so unique an animal that you could never forget him." This is high praise coming from the folks that made the incredible harness mare, The DaVinci Code.

An eventual purchase by Mary Gaylord McClean opened a new chapter of Wild Carrissima's career when Melissa Moore took over the training reins. From a distance, Dr. Pugh watched Wild Carrissima's developing show presence, observing the horse's power, charisma, and star personality with growing interest. The bay's balanced strength of motion coupled with his unchecked show horse attitude firmly cemented his desire to acquire the horse.

Finally this year at Lexington Junior League, Dr. Pugh competed in the qualifying class with his now World's Champion, CHRevolver, against Melissa Moore at the reins with Wild Carrissima. "I was driving my own horse in the class but I couldn't stop watching Melissa show that horse!" After the show that night, Dr. Pugh went to Bret Day and expressed his desire to own the horse. The trainer replied to his client, "I have enough projects right now," but in response Dr. Pugh quipped, "Well, guess what? You have another one coming!"

Eventually the cards all fell into place and Chip Pugh finally obtained the object of his from-afar affection. "I thank Mary from the bottom of my heart for giving me the opportunity to own a horse like this. He is a total athlete," says the

proud new owner. "I like to call him 'Wild Child,' because he's just got such strong, wild motion. This horse is a man's driving horse. He's big, powerful, and...well, he's just a man's horse."

What does Mary Gaylord McClean say about that description? "Oh, that's exactly what that horse is. He needed to be owned and driven by a man. Melissa did an excellent job with him, but I'm excited that he went to Bret and Chip. He wasn't working out for me; he is so strong-moving that I called him my big ol' Hackney Pony." Ms. McClean did drive him at the May Classic, and paints a comical picture of the event. "The one time I showed Wild Carrissima, I think I was practically lying down in the cart, I was leaning back so far," she says with infectious laughter. "I came out of the class and said, 'Well, that's the last time I'll be driving him!" Of course, her saving grace was that she won the class.

Dr. Pugh is quick to give praise where it is due. "Melissa Moore deserves so much credit for bringing this horse along. I'm sure it couldn't have been easy to see the horse go so close to the World Championship."

Melissa Moore will tell you herself that it was a bittersweet sale. "It was hard for me to lose a horse like that. He is a very, very special horse — the epitome of a show horse. At a show, when you point him to that gate, Willy hits another gear that he never does at home." And at Sunrise Stables, "He was the first horse I'd work every morning. It was a great way to start my day, working one that was such a true professional. I'd drive him around my outside track, and he'd go just like a big Hackney Pony," she says, her remark echoing that of the horse's former owner. Of Mary Gaylord McClean, Ms. Moore will tell you, "She is one of the ideal owners in the business. She is very conscientious of how her trainers feel; she was really sweet about selling him because she knew he'd be a

top contender in the Stake, and she took my thoughts into consideration with the sale."

And since Melissa Moore likens Wild Carrissima to "the fine harness version of Swish," that's a tough sale to see through to its completion. She continues, "I didn't have to win the fine harness, but I had no doubt that Bret could do it. It was hard, but I was so proud when they did it!" Ms. Moore goes on to say that she not only delivered the horse to Bret Day herself, but she made multiple calls to him in the following days. She says with good humor, "I'd call Bret and say, 'Oh, I forgot to tell you this!' and, 'Hey, just to let you know, I'd always do this with him!' Bret was great about it. We shared a lot of the same tricks; used the same supplements, even the same chiropractor, so it helped make an easy transition for the horse."

Wild Carrissima is the horse that brought Bret Day to his first World's Grand Championship win. "The horse intrigued me," he says of the impression he got from the bay gelding that was a literal and visual handful. "When Chip wanted to put things into motion I called Melissa and said, 'How crazy is he?' and she told me that he wasn't at all, that he was just strong." Susi Day adds, "Melissa assured us that he was okay, and Mary would never let us buy him if he'd have been too much of a challenge."

Bret Day went to Melissa Moore's Sunrise Stables to drive him prior to the sale and reported back to his client Dr. Pugh that, after getting a feel of the horse, he thought he could bring him along to where he could drive him. "The horse was just like she said; pretty strong outside, but no silliness." After the sale was completed, says Day, "I did exactly what Melissa

told me to do with him. I did some things to tweak to make him a little more comfortable, but I really did very little."

Louisville loomed, and with the horse delivered on August 12, there was only a narrow window of time for the horse and trainer to get acquainted with each other, much less prepare for the biggest class of their lives. But in the Wednesday fine harness qualifier, Bret Day and Wild Carrissima connected. "I learned more about how the horse thinks in the seven or eight minutes during that class than the whole week I'd had him in training!" he reflects.

Before the class, knowing what a strong force the gelding was, Day says he even double checked the stitching on the hand holds of the lines to be sure they were strong enough. Then in the class, the A-ha moment came when he turned the

horse to reverse direction. "I knew he had a tendency to want to hug up on the rail going the second way, so I brought him off the wall into the middle." Being off the rail forced the horse to rely more on the guidance of the driver, keeping his considerable power a bit more

under wraps. It gave Day a game plan for Stake night.

"It's like billiards," Bret Day explains. "A great pool player isn't thinking just about the shot; they think about where they'll place their cue ball for the next shot. That's how you have to ride or drive a horse; you have to think ahead to the next move, the next pass." Now that he had found

"On Saturday I knew there'd be five or six of the world's best drivers jockeying for position in the ring," Day remembers of the big night. "I had to have the attitude that I couldn't second guess myself. Then it hit me, when I was in the square warm up ring right down by Freedom Hall, that there were three drivers who'd already won this class going around with me." Of course the most desirable position is to be the last horse to blast into the ring, something that normally is conceded to the senior competitors who've, in past events, left with the coveted blanket of roses. But that night as the horses filed in one by one for the Fine Harness World's Grand Championship, Bret Day remembers, "I just kept going around and around," and eventually he and Chip Pugh's big bay were

2011 THREE-GAITED WORLD'S GRAND CHAMPION REAL ACTION

In June of 2007, Kim Cowart was standing near center ring in Springfield, Illinois, judging the Midwest Charity Horse Show. She couldn't believe her eyes when a beautiful chestnut with a look of excitement in his eyes came through the gate in the UPHA Three-Gaited Park Pleasure Classic with Tom Thorpe aboard. After the show, she contacted Tom and purchased the horse for her client Jackie Ware. That horse was CHI'm McDreamy. Kim finished out McDreamy's three-year-old year by winning the Three-Year-Old Three-Gaited World's Championship at Louisville and with a reserve finish in the UPHA Three-Gaited National Championship at the Royal.

The following year, the dynamic team was crowned Reserve World's Champion of Champions in the Junior Three-Gaited Championship at Louisville. The reserve world title was bittersweet, though, as McDreamy was sold to the Chancellor family during the show.

A couple of months after Louisville, Kim was again standing in center ring in Springfield, but this time for the Mid-America Mane Event Horse Show. About judging the show in 2008, Kim stated, "I was still bummed about selling McDreamy, but then [Real Action] came through the gate, and I thought 'thank God!' He came through the gate and it was like déjà vu, I was standing in the same place as when I first saw McDreamy, they both had a similar way of going and the white around their eyes. Robin bought him sight unseen, and it turned out."

Did it ever.

It is obvious why Real Action caught Kim's eye. He catches every-

one's eye. His headset is perfect and his motion, from both the front and back end, is divine. What separates him from other horses with similar qualities of great headsets and motion, though, is the excitement he exudes with each stride. He never backs an ear, and he has the explosive look in his eye, that he shares with the true great Amer-

ican Saddlebred show horses. He shares this look, even, with this year's two other World's Grand Champions, Courageous Lord and Wild Carrissima.

Because Real Action is such an extraordinary horse, many have followed his career closely, from his first class at Mid-America Mane Event through his World's Grand

World's Grand Champion Real Action taking a well-deserved break.

Championship performance at Louisville in August. As any horse does from two to five, he has matured. But with his maturity he has not lost his special spark, which has made him so extraordinary. His spark is as strong as ever, with no indication it will fade for a very long time.

Tom Scott showed Real Action to the Two-Year-Old Three-Gaited win at the Mid-America Mane Event horse show and in the same class in November at the UPHA/American Royal National Championships. Tom picked out Real Action as a two-year-old that same year in early spring. He selected the fancy gelding from Virgil and Sandra Helm.

"He blew me away in longlines, Nikki Harrison worked him. He wasn't real blowy or snorty, but his timing front and back was almost perfect. We started to ride him a month after we got him home." Tom continued, "He was easy to train, but not easy to stay on, just guide him along and stay out of his way. The hottest ride I have had in some time was at the Royal when he was two." Both Peter and Kim Cowart share similar sentiments about what Real Action is like to ride.

"He is very smart and very quick. You don't teach him to use his legs, you don't teach him to wear his bridle, he's a natural, he just does it! He could go sideways faster than anything you've ever seen, but now that he's five years old, he's matured," said Kim.

Peter agrees that he is incredibly athletic and smart, "He's a real individual, he's a very intelligent horse. He's very game, you don't have to push...he thinks a lot of himself."

With the way Peter and Kim describe him, it is obvious that he is a blast to ride. Powerful underneath you, game, no pushing required, a headset that is perfect, without requiring a lot of work. Anyone who has gotten to experience riding a Saddlebred similar to that knows that is the most fun you can have! They are easy to make look good, but also require some skill to keep them doing the right thing at the right time. But Real Action's intelligence helps him to do all three-gaits perfectly at the right time in the right place.

It certainly takes a horse that is intelligent and athletic to achieve the kind of success that Real Action has. In fact, out of all 20 performances Real Action has

made, he has
been beaten only
once. With that
defeat came
comeback success, however,
because after his
reserve finish in
the junior over
two class at
Louisville, he
came back to win
the Junior
Championship
with Peter aboard.

Peter has not been the only mount for the successful now fiveyear-old, though. Kim showed him last year at the J.D. Massey and Asheville Lions Club Horse Shows. Of showing him, Kim explained that she had a lot of fun, but, "I really like to watch Peter show him because I want him to be the best he can be, but I ride every step with him."

Although Kim is not his regular mount, she does have an even more regular and arguably more important role in his life. "We call him 'Jackson.' Tom Scott called him Jackson for 'Action Jackson.' I take care of him, and I'm the only one who gets to touch him," she laughs. "He is very special; he has a TON of personality. I can say his name ten stalls away, and he will come up to the front of his stall with his ears up," Kim's love for Jackson is obvious as she exclaims, "Jackson is very special, he's not just a regular horse, he's very special!"

It is clear that Jackson holds a very special place in the hearts of both Kim and Peter. As a young horse, only five, it is truly incredible just how special he really is. Five is often an awkward age for a horse. They are out of the junior division and must show against the aged veterans of the show ring, yet they are still maturing and growing both physically and mentally. Jackson has had absolutely no difficulty entering the ring as a fiveyear-old, though, as he has left the ring last in every performance of his five-year-old year. This is truly

> an amazing feat, as horses, just like humans are bound to have an off day, but it seems that even an off day for Jackson is still a better day than his competitors.

Going into Louisville, Cowart's West Wind Stables already had two

World's Grand Champions. Kim and CHA Sweet Treat were crowned the Three-Gaited World's Grand Champions in 1999, and Peter and CHBreaking News were crowned the Five-Gaited World's Grand Champions in 2008. But

special; he has







both conclude that the previous World's Grand Champions were under much different circumstances than Jackson.

"It's a really cool thing to win a World's Grand Championship, when we won with Sweet Treat, we hadn't had any of the success like we had over the last ten years. We showed her because she hadn't worked out for the client. She was just as spooky as Jackson but not as game. She was really cool, but Jackson is way gamer, there was more conditioning with her," said Kim. Peter also feels that CHBreaking News' win was very different, "News was different because he's always been a great horse, but never got the credit for it, but he came back and proved himself over and over again, and then he'd keep beating the 'next big horse,' and keep trucking. It is pretty amazing how good of a horse he was."

Peter continued with his thoughts on Jackson going into the three-gaited championship at Louisville, "Jackson has pretty much been primed for the walk-trot stake since he was a two-year-old. Last year I thought if nothing went wrong with him, he'd continue to prove it. I thought for sure that he had every reason to win, but it was a very different scenario."

Learning about CHBreaking News from Peter and Kim gives a great insight to the kind of trainers they are. They truly love their horses. Any given day at West Wind Stables you may find CHBreaking News being ridden bareback through the aisle with a halter and lead rope, and possibly a crown on his head. Peter says that News will always hold a special place in his heart because he is such a wonderful horse, and even as he nears retirement he will always keep his stall in the main training barn at the farm. Peter emphasized that News has a home for life, and that he could be his Five-Gaited World's Grand Champion trail riding mount, as he is as laid back as he is talented.

Although their wins were under

different scenarios, News and Jackson do share a certain closeness as they live right next to each other at West Wind Stables in Statesville, NC.

"Jackson is next to CHBreaking News because he is a calming, good influence, and I would hope that he would learn from News," explained Kim.

While everything was perfect going into Louisville for Real Action, Peter and Kim both agree that although he won the World's Grand Championship, it was not his best performance. Before the show Peter said that he was fairly confident that Real Action would win, as he said, "I think he is by far the best horse. Bottom line." But as anyone in the horse industry knows, there is no "sure thing."

"He was injured Wednesday morning, but he is so game that he showed not as good as he should have but good enough," said Kim. Although he wasn't his normal self, Peter explained the kind of horse that Jackson is, the kind that exemplifies greatness, "Louisville was not one of his better performances, but to win a World's Grand Championship you've got to have a horse that even on their bad day is fantastic, and I think that's what kind of horse he is. He's not had a hair out of place his whole career, then some things popped up out of nowhere... but we still showed, no excuses."

Showing with his minor injury makes Jackson's win all that more impressive for the still maturing five-year-old.

But what's next for the outstanding gelding? When asking Peter where Real Action is headed next, his answer was quite simply, "To the winner's circle."

With a career such as Jackson's, there are undoubtedly many more victory passes in his future. Is it possible that owner Robin McKenzie Vuillermet may show him? Possibly. Kim said that she would like to ride him, "Robin has ridden him here at the barn, it was pretty darn good! I think down the line we might like to win the walktrot stake again, maybe the ladies, we don't know yet."

Peter agrees, "I think Robin would like to show him, and I don't see any reason why she can't show him. Camille (Peter and Kim's daughter) has ridden him once. "He's a good horse, Robin is a wise enough owner to do it when it's right for her and the horse. She has ridden him and got along with him great."

The near future is up in the air as well, "We might take him to the Royal, but right now he's going to get some time off," said Peter.

The time off will be welldeserved for the grand horse with a 95% win rate, but soon again he will be in the winner's circle.

Since he won the Three-Gaited Grand Championship at Lexington Junior League, perhaps he will go for the Three-Gaited Triple Crown and a National Championship by showing at the UPHA/ American Royal National Championships in November.

2011 FIVE-GAITED WORLD'S GRAND CHAMPION COURAGEOUS LORD

AND MERRILL MURRAY

The late Hall of Fame horseman Marty Mueller was not only one of Merrill Murray's closest friends, but also served as his mentor. Marty often told Merrill that there are only so many great rides in any horse, and advised him to be careful not to use them all up at home. Merrill obviously listened and listened well, as evidenced by the explosive performance he and Courageous Lord put on for the appreciative Saturday night crowd in this year's Five-Gaited World's Grand Championship (WGC).

Under the new ownership of Fox Grape Farm, Merrill and Courageous Lord defeated three of the best World's Champion fivegaited horses showing today, in a four-horse workout that had the crowd roaring with delight. As Merrill said later, "The stars aligned and everything came together."

So many great stories have been written about Courageous Lord since his first World's Champion win, three years ago, that it's hard to find something new to share with his fans. So, for a different take on things, let's first look at the records this popular gelding has set. When Courageous Lord was crowned 2011 Five-Gaited World's Grand Champion, his fans cheered in acknowledgement of this wonderful feat — his third consecutive WGC win. What his fans may not have realized is that they were witnessing history being made. Courageous Lord is the very first gelding in the history of the World's Championship Horse Show to win the Five-Gaited WGC three consecutive times. Since Cascade became the first gelding to win the Five-Gaited WGC in 1918, there have been many geldings who have vied

for repeat wins. Those that came close to achieving Courageous Lord's record include four-time winner CHImperator (1980, 1981, 1985, and 1986); CHOak Hill Chief (1943, 1945, and 1946) and Mass Of Gold (1920, 1921, 1923), but none of them wore the roses three times in a row. The last horse of

any sex to replicate the feat was the stallion CHSky Watch with wins in 1982, 1983 and 1984, a reign that began 20 years ago.

Merrill Murray, Courageous Lord's trainer and rider to each of his three victories, also set some records of his own. Merrill is one of only three living exhibitors to have

won the Five-Gaited WGC with three different horses. With Courageous Lord's first WGC win in 2009, Merrill joined trainer Redd Crabtree (CHWill Shriver in 1976, CHCora's Time in 1978 and (SA) Zovoorbij Commander In Chief in 1997) and amateur Michele Macfarlane (CHSky Watch in 1988, CHMemories' Citation in 1996, and CH(SA) CCV Casey's Final Countdown in 2007) in this elite club.

Prior to winning the big one with Courageous Lord, Merrill had been victorious with SS Genuine in 2002, and 15 years earlier with CHOur Golden Duchess in 1987. The late Earl Teater is the only exhibitor to have more Five-Gaited WGC wins with different horses, winning the class 11 times on five different horses. However, even the inimitable Mr. Teater never won the class three consecutive times aboard a gelding.

A study of Courageous Lord's four generation pedigree offers insight into the reasons he has been able to achieve his record breaking status. One look at Courageous Lord's breeding makes it apparent that he was bred to be just the kind of ground-pounding five-gaited powerhouse that he has become. He was selectively bred by Mike and Kathy Barlow, who started him and owned him until his four-

year-old year. His sire, Roseridge Heir (owned by the late Randy Tabor for the majority of his breeding career), was a winning five-gaited show horse himself, and sired such gaited stars as 2000 World's Champion Three-Year-Old Five-Gaited mare Himalaya, 2005 World's Champion Three-Year-Old Five-Gaited Stallion/Gelding Linkin Park, and current Reserve World's Champion Five-Gaited Stallion I'm Lookin' For You.

Roseridge Heir was a son of the lightly bred Madeira's Gift, a grandson of the the Hall of Fame Broodmare Aflame (who produced three-time World's Champion Five-Gaited Stallion CHBroadland's Captain Denmark) and Oman's Desdemona Denmark, sire of two of the most revered five-gaited mares in history, CHBelle Elegant and CHSummer Melody. The dam of Roseridge Heir was a daughter of the famous Missouri stallion Ridgefield Heir, sire of two-time amateur and ladies five-gaited World's Champion CHCedar Creek Farewell and three-time amateur and ladies five-gaited World's Champion CHCedar Creek Cactus Flower, among others.

Lord Have Mercy, the dam of Courageous Lord, was also a product of the Tabor family breeding program. She was bred by Randy Tabor and her sire, 3-T's Worthy
One, was bred by Randy's father
Glyndle Tabor. 3-T's Worthy One
was a lightly bred son of the prolific
Worthy Son, sire of such five-gaited
World's Champions as Worthy's
Temptress and CHPeppermint
Sonburst and five-gaited Reserve
World's Champions CHMiss Lillie
O'Lee and Worthy Decision.

Courageous Lord's second dam, Admiral's Courageous Queen, was sired by the winning five-gaited stallion CHCourageous Admiral, sire of arguably two of the best amateur five-gaited geldings in history — World's Champion CHAdmiral's Mark, World's Champion CHNatural Rights, as well as the breeding stallion and amateur five-gaited WC CHTop Spool. CHCourageous Admiral's sire was the 1963 Reserve World's Champion Junior Five-Gaited and superb breeding horse Wing's Fleet Admiral. Though sparingly bred, all of Wing's Fleet Admiral's offspring tended to carry his propensity for gameness. Courageous Lord's third dam, Letitia Bourbon was a Bourbon Commander daughter. Bourbon Commander sired the ultra game five-gaited World's Champion CHCommander's Society Knight (shown as Society Knight). He also sired Leila Lee Bourbon, the second dam on the sire line of two-time World's Grand Champion Five-Gaited CHWild-Eyed And Wicked. With such a strong fivegaited lineage behind him, it is no surprise that Courageous Lord is the first gelding to win three consecutive Five-Gaited WGC titles.

Anyone who has followed the career of Courageous Lord, aka "Joe" to his closest friends, knows that he is a horse that thrives on routine. He does not like sudden changes. The first year Merrill showed him at Louisville he did not bring along Daniel Segura, Joe's regular caretaker. As they began getting Joe ready for his first class he became agitated and no one could calm him. Fortuitously, Daniel had driven over that night to watch him show. He stopped by the











stall area to wish the team luck and as soon as Daniel walked into his stall Joe settled down, got his mind back on business and went on to win his first World's Championship title. Merrill made sure Daniel never missed another show!

Merrill's longtime assistant Chris Brannan has both ridden and jogged Joe over the years. The first time Merrill went off to a show and Chris stayed home to work horses he was underwhelmed when it came time to jog Joe. As he later told Merrill, "This is one of the most boring horses I have ever jogged" and Merrill is quick to agree.

"This horse is so smart it's uncanny. I like to put a lot of slow miles on him to keep him fit and Joe has it figured out. He jogs like 'Old Shep,' as slow as possible, barely breaking into a trot, for the first rounds, then when he figures out that his jogging time is almost up; he kicks it up a few notches so he can be done faster. I have always said a smart horse is a lot harder to train than a dumb one. You have to try to stay one step ahead of the smart ones and that's the trick to this horse."

Along with crediting Daniel Segura and Chris Brannan as integral parts of the Courageous Lord team, Merrill is quick to add the importance of the role Bobby Isham, his farrier, has played. "Bobby has the horse balanced just right. He has kept him comfortable and Joe feels comfortable with him."

Dr. Owen Weaver and her mother, Lynn Via, went to Merrill's barn to look at a three-year-old five-gaited filly. While standing next to Courageous Lord's stall, Owen mentioned how much she had always admired the horse and wondered what it would be like to ride him. To her surprise, Merrill jumped on her comment and arranged for her to do just that. Before she ever got on, Merrill spent time talking her through what to expect. He told Owen that she needed to simply think ahead and always give Joe direction. "Let him make too many decisions on

his own and like a teenage boy, he will probably make the wrong one," said Merrill.

Feeling a bit nervous now that she was actually going to get her chance to ride a horse of this caliber, Owen turned to her mother. Lynn Via looked her in the eye and said "You can do this. Just do it." Owen was amazed that the powerhouse of a horse stood quietly for her to mount from a step, waited for her to gather her reins and then calmly walked off, "I walked him up and down the aisle and then stopped at the end. Joe looked back at me as if to say - come on lady, aren't we going to do more than walk? My dream had always been to ride a ground-pounding, bigtime, gaited horse, and when Joe stepped up to a trot I knew I was on that kind of horse," said Owen.

Lynn and Owen had not had a particularly good past few years with the loss of not only their dear friend and former trainer Patty Milligan, but also the loss of Owen's bold five-gaited gelding Busting Out. Owen asked Peter Via what he would think about purchasing a new gaited horse - one that happened to be a 10-year-old-gelding. Peter responded that it would depend on the horse. After telling him which horse it was and showing

him the tape of Joe winning at Lexington this year Peter Via said simply, "Do it."

On August 2, 2011, Courageous Lord became the property of Fox Grape Farm, exactly four years to the day after he was first purchased by Marsha Shepard and Bill Carrington. It was a bittersweet

moment for Marsha and Bill, who remain Joe's biggest fans. The Vias decided to keep Joe with Merrill through Louisville and go for the big stake one more time, and then
