## Want to get an AOT group started? Here's how!

Starting an Amateur/Owner/Trainer (AOT) group within your Charter Club can be a great benefit to amateurs, professionals, and newcomers to the American Saddlebred. An amateur may have a horse at home that they feel would not be competitive in a Show Pleasure class, but may be very competitive in an AOT Show Pleasure class. A professional may be able to sell a horse to someone who has the facilities and is capable of training their horse at home. A newcomer may not be able to afford a $\$ 50,000$ show horse, but can afford that $\$ 10,000$ show horse, which they can show in an AOT class. Or, if all they want to do is trail ride, a professional may sell a \$2,500 horse that just wasn't destined for the show ring, to a family who wants to enjoy their Saddlebred at home.

All of these things are possible with the American Saddlebred, and amateurs who keep their horses at home play a major role in making this happen.

The American Saddlebred Association of the Carolinas (ASAC) AOT Club plays a major role in the Carolinas, with the promotion of the breed, educational clinics, helping with the horse shows, and anywhere else we may be needed. We stable together, share expenses, and help each other prepare for shows. We are a standing committee under the umbrella of ASAC but we are self-supported. We raise money to sponsor our classes, make
donations to Saddlebred Rescue, manage ASAC-sponsored winter tournaments, and even provide a continental breakfast every morning at the ASAC Horse Show.

Here is a brief "FAQ" that may prove helpful in starting an AOT group in your Charter Club.

What is an AOT? An AOT is an amateur who trains his or her own horse at home. The owner is in complete control of all of the horse's training and care.

This sounds like me. How can I get and AOT Club Started? Designate a contact person and post flyers around horse shows. Share your mission with interested members and set up meetings at each show. Organize a group of "take charge" volunteers and elect club officers. Publish bylaws to keep club members and activities organized and on track. Approach show managers and organizers about adding AOT classes to their show schedules. Let the show managers know that the club will sponsor the classes. Spread the word!! Let members and friends know about the shows adding classes, and encourage entries and support. Numbers will speak loudly.

We are off to a good start. How do we keep the club going? Promotion: Use horse shows, websites, email campaigns and other forms of outreach to share the club mission and grow membership.

Education: Organize events like professional clinics, barn tours, and workshops for members to learn and improve their skills.


Fundraisers: Come up with fun and creative ways to raise the money needed to sponsor classes and club events.

Support: Encourage club members to help each other both at home and at the horse shows. Reach out to supportive professionals and amateurs.

We now have a logo that we are printing on tote bags and caps to give out to the first place winners in the AOT classes that we sponsor. We are also selling these promotional items as a fundraiser. We are firm believers in PROMOTION, PROMOTION, PROMOTION! We want people to buy Saddlebreds, and not say "I love the breed but can't afford one because they are too expensive, and I have to keep it in training." This is a breed for every discipline from the show ring to the back yard trail horse.

If you need help starting an AOT club within your Charter Club, and would like more information, please contact me. I will be glad to help you get started.

## addlebred Beginnings

"Well, good morning, Kiddo!" my Saddlebred mentor greeted me, her faded eyes crinkling up at me with a tired smile. "I was just about to take Red out for a ride. Why don't you saddle up your mare and come along?"
It was a familiar invitation, and one I rarely declined in my childhood. My friend K.J. "Johnny" Hanamann sold me my first horse, the mare that fastened me irrevocably to this breed, and it was Johnny who influenced me to continue my youthful horse obsession into adulthood. Without her presence in my life, I would most certainly not have become so actively involved with Saddlebreds.

Johnny was a tiny little spitfire of a woman who barely reached five feet tall, but filled in the space with a very strong personality. Like the other kids at the barn, I both admired and feared her so much that I lived to please her, striving to clean the most stalls, sweep the unreachable cobwebs, and groom to the highest shine. She would then come behind us and instruct how the stalls could have been picked better, point out the missed cobwebs, and make us undo the silly braided manes ("Do you want her to rip out a hunk of mane when she gets it caught outside somewhere?!"). Johnny was always urging us to use our heads, especially around the horses. She had a big wooden sign posted at the end of the aisle that read: "THIMK!" and it took me awhile to understand its pur-posely-misspelled meaning. Often rather than speak, if she disapproved of our actions (like leaving a horse unattended in the cross ties) she'd pull us

along by the arm to the plank of wood with the big block letters and wordlessly jab her work-worn finger up at that sign, urging us to "Think!"

For her size, Johnny was a formida-
ble horsewoman. Throughout my years at Lone Oak Stable, she housed many Saddlebreds, including two stallions, both of whom clearly loved and respected their tiny owner. She would
trailer her favorite, Clancy, the sire of my mare, to her northern Wisconsin cottage on the occasional weekend and ride him bareback in the lake. We shared many rides together, and she'd verbally walk me through the pedigrees of the top horses of the day; CHSky Watch, ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Imperator, and Chubasco were her three favorites. She was something of a pedigree fanatic, and spoke of the leading stallions of that time with an almost tangible reverence. I even have an old black and white photograph of Johnny standing next to Vanity's Sensation of Crebilly, taken when, on a drive across country, she stopped at a beautiful barn that turned out to be the home of the famous stallion. In the picture she stands beside him, her hand seemingly so small on the gleaming arched neck of the prolific stallion, and her smile glows. Though she never personally showed any of her Saddlebreds, she closely followed the show world through the glossy pages of magazines, and she rarely missed a Kentucky State Fair.

Johnny was a selective collector of Saddlebred valuables, and this passion trickled down to me. She kept her precious original volumes of Susanne's "Famous Saddle Horses" under close guard, but liberally decorated the tack room with items that would incite hot bidding wars nowadays on eBay. Ezra Brooks whiskey decanters fashioned after fivegaited Saddlebreds, brass King's Genius doorstops, photographs of famous stallions that are the backbone of our bloodlines, pinned to the tack room wall, as though they

 owners, and exhibitors alike have all experienced a catalyst that sparked a passion for this breed.were commonplace. And of course, stacks and stacks of breed magazines. Sitting at Johnny's scarred oak bench, cleaning bridles sporting ostentatious (but totally cool, at that time) brow bands studded with large rhinestones, she'd pour through Saddlebred magazines with us horse-crazy kids. We learned what good conformation was, and what was desirable equitation form, through her guidance and merciless drilling, straight out of Helen Crabtree's famous equitation guide. But no one was allowed to ride a horse in her barn until we'd read Happy Horsemanship, by Dorothy Henderson Pinch (Simon \& Schuster, copyright 1966). She would quiz us on the book's most important points of horse smarts, until she was satisfied that we could get in the saddle with some knowledge. Today, nearly thirty years later, before any child rides solo in my barn, they have to read the same book, still in print. If they sufficiently pass my oral test, they get to ride with my very own vintage rhinestone bridles.

Each of us has known someone - or some horse - who influenced us to become Saddlebred enthusiasts. Trainers, breeders, owners, and exhibitors alike have all experienced a catalyst that sparked a passion for this breed. Even those in our industry who have "been in it forever" have someone to thank for their beginnings. Telling our stories helps us all to feel a bit more connected, and gives us a chance to voice appreciation to those who inspired us to promote and enjoy the American Saddlebred.

## Jim Aikman

Mr. Aikman has a Saddlebred industry service record that would roll out like Santa's list, but where exactly did he get his start in Saddlebreds? It was a combination of the family business and lucky proximity. "My mother and father owned a livery stable for many years, so horses were a part of our life.
Eventually we moved to Indianapolis, where there was a farm just up the road from us where we could rent a stall."

His parents thought it was time to invest in a horse, so they bought a $\$ 100$ gelding that did five gaits, from the highly respected Bottom Brothers Stable. "He could rack as slick as they came," reflects Mr. Aikman fondly. "We all rode him. And we were only eight miles from Dorothy Thomas' Stable, who had the great Indiana Ace breeding stallion. Eventually I went there to have formal lessons."

True to his historian nature, Mr. Aikman was able to produce a photograph of him riding triple on his first

Saddlebred gelding with two childhood friends. Incidentally, Mr . Aikman owes a debt of gratitude to that grand little horse for gifting him with such fond memories of the girl in the picture, because, 71 years later, "That same girl is now my lady friend."

## Melinda and Melissa Moore

Being born of equine training royalty, it might be easy to guess the source of Tom Moore's daughters' inspiration to become Saddlebred trainers, breeders, and judges. But was there a particular horse that cemented them to this breed?
"Silver Sensation was a steel gray gelding at the barn," says Melinda. "When I was very little, I was always anxious to get out there, and he was my favorite. He'd lay down in his stall all the time; if he wasn't being worked or standing in the crossties, he'd prefer to be laying down. I'd go into his stall and climb up on his back and sit there. Sometimes he'd stand up and I'd just hold onto his mane and go with him."

The image is easy to conjure, and an experience the likes of which so many of us have experienced in childhood. From her father Melinda

learned the practice of treating her horses like family.
"Like he did, I go to the barn at night and check on them all. I really live with my horses."

Melinda's sister Melissa remembers fondly watching the famed gaited mare ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Belle Elegant in the Five-Gaited World's Grand Championship with Jack Nevitt in 1975. "To me she was the epitome of a great gaited horse. I loved that mare; she was amazing!"

Three years later the mare came back to whoop the boys again in the Gaited stake, winning another World's Grand Championship with Ed Teater.

As an adult, Melissa Moore was thrilled to pilot Twice Charmed - a great granddaughter of ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Belle Elegant - to numerous wins, including the 2007 American Royal FiveGaited Championship.


## Don Harris

Everyone recognizes the name and fame that is Don Harris, but perhaps not all know the interesting start to his brilliant equine career. The son of a coal miner, he learned from his father how to train by working the mules that were expected, as part of their everyday job, to navigate long, steep slopes down into the mines. "My father was a natural born horseman," comments Mr. Harris, who clearly inherited the genes. Local farmers would send their rough broncs to Mr. Harris to break as a kid.

His passion for horses came along his maternal side, too. "My mother knew a horse. She sat on more hard bleacher seats between basketball and horse shows to watch me." Mr. Harris will tell you, "My first Saddlebred was a three-gaited pony who could go five-gaited. The first time I showed him, my father told me, 'Now, when you win, you tell them this is a racking pony, and then you go and rack him around that ring.'" And that was the day that the mod-ern-day victory pass was born.

"He let me practice a lot with the Hackney ponies, and they opened the door to the Saddlebreds for me." Perhaps best known for his success with the late great breeding stallion Phi Slama Jama, Dr. Raun certainly impacted the Saddlebred industry with his dedication to the breed. His present breeding operation carries on the tradition of standing quality stallions that produce winning show horses.
 Joan Hamilton The Kalarama Farm professional thanks her father for igniting an interest in American Saddlebreds. As a boy he enjoyed riding a neighbor's Saddle Horses, and he always imagined himself having such a horse some day. "When my father and I finally went out to buy one together, he selected a Saddlebred. If I hadn't had dad to stoke that interest, I probably wouldn't have horses. I'm lucky." Now at the helm of the farm that brought the prolific World's Champion Harlem Globetrotter to the breeding industry, Hamilton and her staff will be foaling out well over 40 select mares this year.


## Carson Kressley

This dapper star of modern television programs may lead a busy lifestyle but he never fails to support the breed. Who sparked his interest in Saddlebreds? "I have to thank my Grandmother, Pauline Kressley, for getting me involved with Saddlebreds. She was a major Shetland and Hackney Pony breeder. Of course, when you grow up around literally hundreds of ponies, all you want is a horse!" We are lucky to have such a popular proponent for the breed who is just as fun to watch both in and out of the show ring.

## Elisabeth Goth

As a child, Elisabeth Goth spent two summers at riding camp at Bobbin Hollow Farm. "I still have all my letters home, mostly asking for money for candy, yammering about Roy, the pony I cared for, and complaining about having to canter 'Cinnamon.'"

Like so many horsecrazy kids, she spent every Saturday at the barn, doing anything to spend time around the horses, from cleaning tack to mucking stalls.
"My parents purchased Saddle Seat Equitation (by Helen Crabtree), which I read often enough to memorize every word and picture," she remembers fondly. She also recalls riding a Morgan named Johnny Appleseed, who was instrumental in providing a firm foundation for her riding. At the same show barn, however, were American Saddlebreds.
"The show barn had two Saddle Horses that mesmerized me; a grey called Wild Thing and a gaited mare named Rainbow." At the age of nine, a young Ms. Goth moved to California and found a saddleseat barn that happened to have Morgans, and it would be some time before she was again exposed to Saddlebreds. Then, in 1981, "I went to the Phoenix Horse Show, and that's where I saw ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Sky Watch and Michele; she showed her fancy pleasure horses and a team of Hackneys, too, and WOW!"

Later, Bob Lewis gave Elisabeth a chance to ride Dare You All, a horse that was a consistent winner in California gaited classes. "That was something," she remarks, "that feeling of power, and speed, and such willingness.

Sometime later at the Santa Barbara Morgan Show, Brooke Deardorf had a tape of ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Sky Watch and ${ }^{{ }^{\mathrm{CH}} \text { Imperator. }}$ I couldn't believe my eyes, and I got

this feeling inside of me..." She doesn't need to further explain, because we've all felt that feeling.

Shortly thereafter, Ms. Goth began riding with Gayle Lampe on a horse named My Crown Royal. That same year, she traveled with Christine Broder and Gayle Lampe to Rock Creek, where Mitchell Clark showed her two of Michele Macfarlane's horses, Cameo's Angel Wings and New York New York. "I came back two weeks after Rock Creek, and my mother bought them for me. I credit my trainer of many years, Garn Walker, with giving me the skill set necessary to be able to ride a horse like New York New York. I showed him at Louisville in 1986 and we were Reserve World Champion of Champions (in the Five-Gaited Amateur Stallion/Gelding), with a huge ovation, and Angel Wings won her division of the Three-Year-Old Three-Gaited. My fate as a die hard, obsessed Saddlebred fan was thus sealed!"

All of that devotion to riding from an early age paid off; Elisabeth Goth made it into the revised edition of Saddle Seat Equitation.

## Yaukee Clipper $\&$ DEB MCCONNELL

South African roots grow as deeply as their love of Saddlebreds for this husband and wife team at Singing Hills Stable. Says Annalize van der Walt, "My dad bred Percherons, so I was always around horses. The first time I ever saw a Saddlebred was a picture in a magazine, and I instantly knew that that was what I wanted."

When she was 12 years old her father bought her an Indiana Ace bred mare that was the first of many Saddlebred loves. Like Annalize, her husband Gene was also struck by the beauty of the breed, watching a horse show in the early 80 s. "I saw a man named A.P Keyter show a horse, and it had a profound impact on me. The beauty and motion of that picture they made... he's the reason I went to work with Saddlebreds."

## Cynthia Hecht

This lifelong contributor served as the Historian, Archivist, Pedigree Analyst and Staff Writer for the ASHA, as well as the curator for the American Saddlebred Museum. As a teenager in the 1950s she enjoyed showing Quarter Horses. One year when showing at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, California, she saw a sight to behold in the warm up ring, which was right next to her stalls. Hecht recalls, "I glanced in there and saw a liver chestnut gelding with a long silver tail motoring along at a tremendous speed. He was warming up for the Five-Gaited Championship. I dashed back to my father and said I'd just seen the most beautiful horse in the world and wanted to watch the class, so we went back to our box. There was a workout for first between that horse and the best horse Bob Lewis had at the time, Richarl Juan. The winner was ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Song of Norway, son of ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ Sweetheart On Parade, with Jim B. Robertson up for Mrs. William P. Roth." Even then Ms. Hecht had a knack for recognizing quality in Saddlebreds. "I said to my father, 'I WANT one of those!'
Eventually he bought Maitani (5th dam

> of 2006 Five-Gaited World's Grand Champion ${ }^{\text {CH}}$ He's The Man) for me. She was related to ${ }^{\text {CH }}$ Song of Norway, from Mrs. Roth's breeding program. Hers was the first pedigree I ever researched, and I was hooked on the history of the Saddlebred then."

## Scott Matton

"My dad trained horses; I grew up in it," the Wisconsin based trainer credits his parentage. "Both my mom and dad gave lessons; equitation was a big deal. Back then everyone did equitation; it was just what you did before you went on to performance horses."

Being the boss's son, however, didn't mean he got any coddling around the barn. "I didn't get lessons; I learned it through the school of experience."

One particular horse taught him invaluable riding knowhow. "There was a horse named Nancy's Happiness Is. He was tough; touchy; you rode him like you were riding on raw eggs," he remembers. "He's the horse that taught me how to ride to stay alive. That horse had absolutely no self-preservation, and I had to ride to keep the both of us safe."

Perhaps it could be said that this horse was the catalyst for the respect and love of equitation that Mr. Matton successfully campaigns in his training and riding program today. "He taught me how to bend my legs, how to feel the horse better, and how to know how a horse thinks. He especially taught me what they won't tolerate, and that you can't dominate them."

Like his father, Matton has built a strong riding and training program with his wife Carol at Knollwood Farm. "I married my best friend, and she understands the dedication and hard work that comes with this business."

## Fred Sarver

A well known breeder and lifelong advocate for the American Saddlebred horse, Sarver grew up in a small town in Bluefield, West Virginia. Not far from him on the Virginia border was the historic Leatherwood Farm, established by the Tierney brothers in 1938. As a teenager he boarded a horse there and eventually became an employee mowing grass, cleaning stalls, and other chores.

Leatherwood proved to be for Sarver the working environment where a special mentorship opened the door for a career in the breeding business. Dr. James P. Bailey, a graduate of the Ohio State University Veterinary School, had served as Leatherwood's farm superintendent and vet until 1951, and later while in private practice, provided routine veterinary service to the farm. Known for his integrity and selfless community service, Dr. Bailey was instrumental in giving Sarver the professional guidance necessary for learning the skills for success in all aspects of the horse breeding business. "Dr. Bailey was my mentor," says Sarver. "He was a kind man who had the ability to lead by example; he was highly principled and respected in his community. Dr. Bailey took me under his wing, and if I have any success today I owe it to him. From this man I drew my inspiration."


## Lynda Freseth

Guiding equitation riders to the highest ranks for Hollow Haven Farm, Lynda Freseth's passion for Saddlebreds was fostered by her
father. "My dad's passion was Saddlebreds, and he got me my first horse at age nine." In addition, the gelding's previous owner, Martha Claire Dantzler, took an active interest in young Lynda's partnership with the horse, becoming a mentor for the team at the shows.

Now at her and husband Andy's facility in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, Lynda Freseth is thanking her father and Ms. Dantzler by paying it forward, inspiring Saddlebred passion in a new generation of riders.

## Darrell Case

Knowing Joan Lurie from the Morgan circuit, and always admiring the way she bridled a horse, he soon came under her employment. Now, 14 Willowbank years later, Mr. Case has streamlined his focus to American Saddlebreds, and his success is evident whenever he enters a ring.

## Romy Ackerberg

A Minnesota-based breeder and exhibitor, Romy Ackerberg was struck - as so many are - by the beauty of the American Saddlebred breed in the pages of a book. Following her pressing intuition she sought out the nearest physical examples of the breed, going to see the stallion Farr's Thunder Road in the flesh at Bob Jensen's stable, not far from her home. "My breath was taken away. I was hooked immediately."

When she bought her first Saddlebred, she says, "She gave me two hundred percent every time I got on her." The owner of Ro \& Me Inc. thanks the late David Farr for sparking her passion to later become a breeder. "David had an encyclopedic knowledge of bloodlines, and before he died, I promised him that I'd take care of his horses."

After a brief ownership by an investment buyer, the World's Champion producing breeding stallion Trust Fund came into her possession some time after Farr's death. The rest, as they say, is history.


Joellen Fisher Blount Like many others, Blount was involved in a different breed entirely before the lure of the Saddlebred sparked her interest. "I started with Arabians with trainer Sullivan Davis, who also worked Saddlebreds, so I saw them being worked at his barn. Then watching Isabel Robson showing Saddlebreds really made an impact on me."

She also credits the late Kaye Ladd for inspiring her to become so heavily involved in our breed. An accomplished amateur exhibitor, Ms. Blount enjoys owning an impressive string of show horses, but remembers one horse in particular that made an unforgettable impression. "Back in the 70s I saw ${ }^{{ }^{C H}}$ Finisterre's Gift of Love show, and I will never forget it. She was black, and she was beautiful."

Today the Lexington, Kentucky resident owns - among many - a lovely black mare of her own, ${ }^{\mathrm{CH}}$ She's My Desire BH, that epitomizes the style and grace of the Walk/Trot horse.

## Victoria Gillenwater

This willowy smiling beauty is easy to spot at any Saddlebred event, and her enthusiasm for showing is contagious. "My 'Papaw' Horace Bedwell bought me a western saddle and built a sawhorse for it until I could someday have a horse of my own. He would take me horseback riding in the mountains every Sunday. He never got to see me own or show a horse, but I will never forget that he is the one who started something great."

Ms. Gillenwater is a long-time exhibitor and dedicated Saddlebred promoter whose horses - if they could - would tell you just how much they love their owner.

"I grew up in a neat environment, and learned the association of hard work with good results. Had my grandfather been a mediocre trainer, I might not have chosen this line of work for myself, but he really was good at it. You could see the change he could instill in horses."

There was no coddling for Mitch Clark despite being in a barn full of champions. "If I wanted to show, I had to be the one to break and train that horse. There wasn't any glamour. My grandfather demonstrated the meaning of dedication." Now that he has twin "colts" of his own, it will be Garland Bradshaw's training and work ethic that trickles down through Mitch Clark to his boys, Mitchell and Garland.
"Well, good morning, Kiddo!" my Saddlebred mentor greeted me, her faded eyes crinkling up at me with a tired smile. "I was just about to take Red out for a ride. Why don't you saddle up your mare and come along?

It was a familiar invitation, and one that made my heart squeeze with emotion now. My friend and Saddlebred mentor looked up at me with instant recognition from her nursing home bed, beckoning me into the small room where she lay. Her gnarled hand passing through her short cap of hair as was her habit, and she managed to sit up against the pillows. "It's a cool day; the horses will be feeling fresh," she continued. "Don't forget your helmet." I knew she was seeing me as that ponytailed teenager again, walking into the tack room at Lone Oak Stables. My throat tightened with sadness as I held out my hand to her, but when she
gripped it with a surprisingly strong grasp, I felt myself steady. "What do you have there, kiddo?" she asked, spying the old photo album I'd brought along. I pulled up a chair beside her and leaned over her metal bed railing, opening up the pages of the past.

Over the next two hours we looked and laughed through years' worth of photographs, Johnny reliving time through the images of horses and young people that had passed through her stable doors. When the last page was turned, she looked up from the album, taking in the foreign surroundings of the sparse room. "This isn't home," she said, confusion and alarm making her voice shaky. But when her eyes came back to me, she smiled again. Her confusion momentarily cleared. "You're all grown up, Jenny. You have children now. Tell me about your family."

We began to speak in the present
day. In her window of clarity I told her how much I cherished my years growing up with her, that I'd become a Saddlebred breeder thanks to her influence. She expressed her pride that I was so involved with Saddlebreds, and this meant more to me than any blue ribbon ever could. At the end of that visit, I told her I was leaving to compete in a Minnesota horse show the next day. She held her hand up and crossed two fingers. Then my Saddlebred mentor smiled and said, "Good luck. Remember that it's the ride, not the ribbon. And when you're in the saddle, don't forget to THIMK."
K.J. "Johnny" Hanamann died the next day. She passed on to me and so many others the love of the breed, the fastidiousness of good horse husbandry, and the foundation of a great beginning.

## Saddlebreds Continue to Excel in Distance Riding Competitions

Two American Saddlebreds, All The Money (affectionately known as Cash) and Far Field Hustle Time, continue to beat out their Arabian competitors in 25 -mile Limited Distance (LD) competitions.

Most recently, at the Bar $\mathrm{H} /$ True Grit ride in Perris, California, Cash took first place, with Hustle Time taking second. The ride was 25 miles, and both horses came in approximately 10 minutes ahead of the third place finisher. Both horses have been competing in LD for the past year, and nearly always come in the top 10; both have come in first, and Cash has two "Best Condition" honors under his saddle.

How did they begin their careers? All The Money was the 1998 World's Champion weanling who went on to be the Western States Horse Expo Breed Ambassador. Carlos and Lisa

Siderman purchased him from Barbara Molland in 2005, to ride trails, and got him into the Parelli program, in which he is a Level 3.

Far Field Hustle Time was trained in saddleseat but never took to it. The Sidermans purchased him in 2004, also as a trail horse. Lisa Siderman was interested in competing, so after reading about Wing Tempo, the American Saddlebred that held the record for the most North American Trail Riding Conference (NATRC) Competitive Trail (CT) miles, she entered the "boys" in their first competition, the Bonelli Park Ride.

The two did well, both placing in the top 4. Cash placed first on their second ride (which was sponsored by the Arabian Horse Association!). A CT ride is either 25 or 35 miles long, and is a pace, not a race. Competitors may not finish the 25 -mile ride before 5.5 hours, or later than 6 hours, without incurring a penalty. Lisa and Carlos found they were holding their horses back, so they
entered them in their first American Endurance Ride Conference (AERC) 25mile LD race. LD is an endurance race of less than 50 miles. The two placed 34 and 35 out of 101 riders, and Cash took Best Condition over all other competitors - with a perfect vet card.

They finished in a little over 4 hours. Carlos was holding Hustle Time back the whole time and decided that in the next race, to let him go. The result was a first place finish for Hustle Time, with Cash finishing just two spots behind, in third, and once again earning Best Condition. Both finished in under 3.5 hours.

Saddlebreds are well suited for distance riding, with their long strides, large hearts, thin skin and lean muscles. To condition for a 25 -mile CT or LD, it is important that a horse is ridden several times a week at long, slow trots. Once they are in shape, it is important that they not be overtrained. Some hill work is also beneficial, but the main goal is to get their muscles stretched and

that during the months of May and June this year, the fee for all registrations received or postmarked during this amnesty period will remain set at $\$ 45$, regardless of the horse's age. An Application for Registration form can be found at www.asha.net/files/ applicationforregistration.pdf.

Amnesty will also be granted for Transfer late fees during this period. The standard $\$ 50$ Transfer fee will still apply to all transfers; however, any late fees accrued at the usual $\$ 10$-per-month rate will not be assessed for transfers received or postmarked during this period. A Transfer Report form can be found at www.asha.net/files/transferform.pdf.

It should be noted that, along with the necessary registration or transfer documentation, the full $\$ 45$
Registration or $\$ 50$ Transfer fee must also be received or postmarked during this period, in order to qualify. Also, this one-time limited offering of amnesty is for late fees only. If applicable, any other registry fees will still be required (DNA testing, unregistered foal transfers, affidavits for lost certificates, etc).

Once this amnesty period has passed, the standard fee schedule will resume for both registrations and transfers.

that during the months of May and June this year, the fee for all registrations received or postmarked during this amnesty period will remain set at $\$ 45$, regardless of the horse's age. An Application for Registration form can be found at www.asha.net/files/ applicationforregistration.pdf.

Amnesty will also be granted for Transfer late fees during this period. The standard $\$ 50$ Transfer fee will still apply to all transfers; however, any late fees accrued at the usual $\$ 10$-per-month rate will not be assessed for transfers received or postmarked during this period. A Transfer Report form can be found at www.asha.net/files/transferform.pdf.

It should be noted that, along with the necessary registration or transfer documentation, the full $\$ 45$
Registration or $\$ 50$ Transfer fee must also be received or postmarked during this period, in order to qualify. Also, this one-time limited offering of amnesty is for late fees only. If applicable, any other registry fees will still be required (DNA testing, unregistered foal transfers, affidavits for lost certificates, etc).

Once this amnesty period has passed, the standard fee schedule will resume for both registrations and transfers.

## Temporary Access Now Offered to Saddlebred.com

In order to provide its members and non-members with access to as much information and features as possible, we'd like to tell you about the following recent additions and updates to the ASHA website.

## Temporary online access

We are excited to announce a new feature available to the general public on saddlebred.com: temporary online access! We have had many questions from non-members about this capability, and we are proud to announce that any non-member now has the opportunity to purchase a temporary online pass.

We offer a temporary one day pass, or one week pass. Anything longer than this would be financially reasonable to warrant a full membership, so we felt that a week was long enough for temporary access. The cost for a one-day pass for research purposes is $\$ 10$, and a week-long temporary pass is $\$ 30$.

The primary distinction between temporary access and full memberships is access to member-only features. Temporary users have access to three research based tools: Pedigree searches, hypothetical matings, and former names. If a non-member simply needs to research a few pedigrees, he or she now has the opportunity to quickly purchase a day or week pass, look up some information, and not have to worry about full annual memberships, long term login information, etc.

It should be noted that these temporary visitors do not have access to the social aspects of the saddlebred.com website, nor do they have access to "My Membership" features such as trail ride tracking or retiring of horses.

Visitors will not have access to search ASHA's online member directory, view the online American Saddlebred Reference Directory or correspondence \& responses. We felt that these tools should only be available to full members, as the purpose of the temporary pass is primarily horse-related research.
