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
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
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Meet Paula Johnson, ASHA's New Executive Director

In June, the American Saddlebred Horse Association (ASHA) officially named Paula Johnson of Mound, Minnesota, as its new Executive Director.

Johnson is a lifelong equine enthusiast who says
horses are "Part

Having
bred and
raised several breeds,
she has long
admired the
American Saddlebred,
and has even attended

the World's Championship Horse Show. Johnson says the American Saddlebred is a breed to which she does have some exposure, although not in depth until now. When asked what interested her most about the opportunity to work with ASHA, Johnson said, "It's a breed that has intrigued me over time for a variety of reasons. The people who are involved with Saddlebreds are so passionate about them, more so than with many other breeds. In addition, the breed is very versatile, and I think those who aren't intimately involved with Saddlebreds may not realize that."

Johnson has also spent time in the American Saddlebred Museum soaking in its history, and has said about the breed, "I was fascinated by the richness of its history, the way it has fit into the tapestry of equine development in America, and the fact that it's a breed that's done such a phenomenal job of both retaining its registry



heritage, and managing the integrity of the bloodlines."

When asked what, if anything, has surprised her about the breed or the organization in her short time with ASHA thus far, Johnson said, "I was not aware of the youth focus, which I think is a wonderful thing, in terms of educating and getting people involved with the breed, and I think it is a very necessary and worthwhile initiative." Johnson also made a point to indicate she has been pleased to see that so many Saddlebred enthusiasts are generally very educated about the breed. Regarding the American Saddlebred Registry, she has described her initial thoughts coming in by saying, "My perception was that it was a very well documented and well managed registry, and I think that's true."

Regarding her goals as Executive Director, Johnson is focused on customer service. According to her, "Our members are our most valuable asset, and those who have interaction with the Association and the Registry should expect and receive excellent customer service." She also looks forward to the opportunity to work toward the breed's advancement, saying, "I hope to be a resource for the Board and the membership as they define the growth path of the breed in the coming years." The Board is also looking forward to working with the new Executive Director. ASHA President Judy Werner states, "We are delighted to have Paula join ASHA. The role of Executive Director is a multifaceted position, and Paula's skill sets are a strong fit to the benchmark that the committee designed prior to beginning the search. ASHA is fortunate to have someone with Paula's professional background join the organization and we look forward to working with her."

Johnson would also like to express that she intends to be accessible. "I'm very approachable, if anyone wants to talk or has a question. Because I'm in an early learning phase about the breed and ASHA, I am looking forward to anybody who's going to help educate me, and that has to come from within the ranks of the organization. I'm very excited to be here, and I'm looking forward to the great things the Association is going to accomplish."



The ASHA Youth Auction is held annually in conjunction with the Kentucky State Fair and World's Championship Horse Show. The silent auction will be held in Crowne Room A of the Louisville Crowne Plaza, and will run from 10 AM to 6 PM on Wednesday, August 25, resuming at 10 AM on Thursday, August 26, and concluding Thursday afternoon at 3 PM. The live portion of the auction will also be taking place in Crowne Room A, and is scheduled to begin at 1:30 PM on Thursday afternoon.

The auction is the sole fundraiser for ASHA Youth Scholarships and all ASHA Youth programs (Junior Judging, Saddletime Awards, Academy Awards, Showmanship at Halter Awards, and the ASHA Youth Award). Since 1991, these funds have helped fund scholarships to further the education of over 100 ASHA Youth members.



Saddlebred Board Approves Proposal for ASHA High Point Awards Program for 2011

As part of the American Saddlebred Horse Association (ASHA) Board of Directors meeting on Tuesday, July 5, in Lexington, Kentucky, the Board approved the ASHA Charter Club Council's ASHA High Point Awards Program proposal for 2011.

In an effort to recognize the achievements of all horses registered with the American Saddlebred Registry (ASR) competing in all disciplines, the ASHA Charter Club Council proposed a High Point Awards Program. Some of the program's objectives are to improve competition opportunities for every Saddlebred owner, provide incentives for additional registrations and transfers, and identify and attract new Saddlebred members.


The Council's proposal details such aspects of the ASHA High Point Awards Program as horse and rider/driver/handler eligibility, competition eligibility, general rules, the point system, and awards. Also included is a list of show classes, including categories for Performance, Equitation, Open Competition, and other options, with verbiage encouraging shows to "add or delete classes according to local preference."

The Charter Club Council also submitted a similar proposal for a Half Saddlebred High Point Awards Program, which the board also approved.

Thoroughbred Racing Association, United States Dressage Federation, and United States Equestrian Federation, to name a few.

The Code addresses equine welfare and responsible care, by supporting a uniform Code of Practice regarding responsible breeding, training, competing, care, use, enjoyment, health, transportation, and retirement of horses, and by initiating communication regarding such issues, not only within the equine community, but with the public, the

(ASHA) Board of Directors, members decided to formally endorse the American Horse Council's (AHC) Welfare Code of Practice.

Also supported by many other breed associations and organizations, this Welfare Code of Practice states, "The horse industry is committed to the safety, health, care and welfare of all horses and to always 'Put the Horse First.'" Organizations already supporting the Code include the American Quarter Horse Association, National

As stated therein, ASHA, AHC and other organizations supporting this Welfare Code of Practice are "Committed to the principle that the welfare and safety of the horse is the guiding principle in the decision-making process for all owners, service providers, organizations, events and activities."

United States Equestrian Federation Offering High School Equestrian Athlete Program

The 2010-2011 year is already underway for the United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) High School Equestrian Athlete program, and students are encouraged to sign up now to count their summer practice and competition hours towards the goal of lettering as a USEF High School Equestrian Athlete.

The High School Equestrian Athlete program is open to equestrian athletes in all breeds and disciplines who are enrolled in grades 9-12. The program runs June 1 - May 31 of each year, and honors those who document their training and competition involvement, regardless of breed or discipline.

The program is now in its second year, and is tracking more than 2,200 students who have earned, or are in the process of earning their letters and pins.

"This is becoming the new standard of achievement among young equestrian athletes," explains Lori Rawls, Executive Director at USEF. "We have athletes who are thrilled to earn their first letter, because their high schools don't recognize equestrian as a competitive sport. We also have athletes who have already earned letters through their school's equestrian program, but realize this is a symbol of achievement within the national equestrian community. Either way, this is a perfect fit."

Annual program registration and USEF membership are required, and USEF membership can be acquired for as little as \$15 annually. In addition, retroactive applications are available to high school students who are interested in earning their letters for previous school years.

Saddle Seat Approved as Emerging Discipline by Interscholastic Equestrian Association

The Interscholastic Equestrian Association (IEA) has officially announced that Saddle Seat is approved as an emerging discipline of IEA, and teams are starting to form all over the United States.

Hundreds of teams and thousands of members have enjoyed participating in IEA Hunt Seat and Western competitions for the past 8 years, but this will be the first year for the Saddle Seat offerings.

The mission of IEA is to introduce students in private and public middle and secondary schools (primarily ages 11 through 19) to equestrian sports, to develop understanding and appreciation of equestrian sports through organized student competitions, to provide students with organized competitive events and to provide additional equine educational opportunities. Through the IEA, students may also have the opportunity to earn scholarships towards their college education.

To form a team, "You need at least 3 students for an Upper School or Middle School team. Teams can form within your own barn or you can help promote Saddle Seat outside of your barn by contacting local schools. The IEA has everything spelled out for you, and it's a great way to expand riding opportunities" says IEA Saddle Seat Coordinator Lark R. Henry.

Not only will the IEA help promote the growth of Saddle Seat riding around the country, but it will also bring a new format for youths to participate in Saddle Seat competitions. "This is going to bring Saddle Seat to a whole new level by making it affordable. It will open a new outlet by allowing riders to get back into showing again without spending a fortune." Says Bille Rae

Graham, of Royal Wind Farm in West Virginia. Graham also coaches an IEA hunt seat team and is the current coach for Marshall University Equestrian Team in Huntington, West Virginia. Graham concludes "This will also help riders to be seen by college recruiters."

Graham will be forming her own IEA Saddle Seat team and is happy to assist or answer any question regarding organizing teams throughout Zone 3 (Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina) and Zone 5 (Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan). In this first, formative year, IEA memberships will be discounted for saddle seat teams and riders. The IEA structure and format will extend to Saddle Seat competitions held from September through April, and top point earners will receive national awards, prizes and scholarships.









A competitor warms up at Stopher Walk outside the entrance to Freedom Hall.

Ferris wheels. Summertime heat paired with the pleasant aroma of fried dough. Blinking lights that beckon your competitive nature. Enormous stuffed animals suspended above tiny plastic ducks swimming in a miniature moat. The sound of delighted children. The distinct earthy smells of various livestock. Teenaged couples walking with pinkies linked through a cacophony of

carnival sounds. Cold ice cream piled high on a waffle cone. Meat on a stick. And of course, the world's finest American Saddlebreds.

Ah, the sights, smells and sounds of the biggest summertime celebration in the heart of horse country. Most of us have been exposed to it, though some more regularly than others. And of course there are those who have yet to discover the experience that is the Kentucky State Fair. The event takes place at one of the finest facilities in the nation, and is certainly one of the most widely attended state fairs in the United States. Of the World's Championship Horse Show some will say it's "just another horse show," but such flippancy will raise the hackles of many competitors who see it as the site of the uber-



show of equine competition, the ultimate goal for top riders and their horses. There is an intensity unlike any other inside Freedom Hall, one that grows exponentially all week long until the last evening's performances, when the coronation of the three World's Grand Champions takes place.

My first experience at the Kentucky State Fair was a magical one. Invited by the woman who gave me my start in the breed, I couldn't wait to see in person what I'd only seen in magazines. We journeyed from Wisconsin to Louisville aboard a Greyhound bus. Just seeing the outside of Freedom Hall was enough to induce goose bumps, and the sight still causes the same reaction in me to this day. My favorite memory, besides being able to pet the legendary John Henry at the Kentucky Horse Park, was sitting in the nosebleed seats on Stake Night, watching the best of the best called into the darkened, packed arena. The horses' impressive entrance into Freedom Hall

was made more dramatic by the spotlight that followed them each around the rail. "There's my pick for the winner," my old friend pointed out with immediate conviction when CHCallaway's Mr. Republican blasted onto the green shavings. My heart thudded in my chest with the thunderous applause for the horses, and that evening I became hopelessly and irrevocably involved in Saddlebreds, I still have the handful

of green shavings, now faded and crumbling, that I scooped up that night, while running down the chute and onto the show ring floor before I had to end my first trip to Kentucky.

The long week at Louisville seemingly flies by, and is liberally dosed with the kind of experiences — both tangible and intangible — that fans of the KSF are happy to share. In fact, this light topic of conversation opened up a much bigger can of worms than I initially anticipated, as numerous Saddlebred enthusiasts pro-

> posed suggestions for the infrequent, or novice Kentucky State Fair goer.

One of the suggested trademark Louisville experiences that anyone new to the horse show simply must enjoy are either the early morning or the late night exercising of the nation's top Saddlebreds. There is nothing like the silence of the dawn, with the soft light and still cool air, the calmness of the day before the fair truly comes awake. To see these horses, their identity partially

obscured by hooded blinders, being jogged or long lined in the outdoor arena or Stopher Walk, is a must-do experience. In the early morning, (and the earlier you get there, the more horses you will see) the atmosphere is relaxed and friendly. A trainer, one leg swinging from the seat of his cart, chats amicably with someone in a baseball cap sitting astride a steaming horse. In the evening, often close to midnight when the heat of the day has dissipated, the horses come out again, their shiny coats gleaming under the glaring overhead lights. These are the times that you can see the reigning Three-Gaited World's Grand Champion working alongside a 13 and Under Equitation rider, or a Country Pleasure Driving horse passing a prancing Western horse. Watching the early morning or late night workouts are worth the loss of sleep.

Of course inside Freedom Hall is where you will see the many carefully planned classes that are the pinnacle of the year's preparation. Former American Saddlebred Horse Association President, longtime breed advocate, and current Kentucky State Fair board member Fred Sarver points out the signature classes as unique to the World's Championship. "If you're a breeder, they're of primary importance. They represent our work." This year's Kentucky Futurity and National Three-Year-Old Futurity is expected to pay out over \$250,000 in prize money.

Now, if you don't have any use for that kind of impressive payout, then

you are welcome to put down your cheater glasses and quit reading right here. But there are those of us who need to get some real payback from our equine investments, if not from the hallelujah of all sales, then from a show ring product of our breeding efforts. In the very least (and here I speak for those of us with Horse-Downer spouses), we would like to have a triumphant "Ta-DAH!" moment in which we may or may not follow with a smug "I told you so!" trailer. The weanling and yearling classes are where it can happen.

Every year I am amazed at the lack of audience during the baby classes. Perhaps people can't get to the show until later in the week, or maybe there's a false assumption that the classes are geared more toward the breeder. But peppered throughout the too-sparse audience are the smart observers who know exactly what it is that they are seeing springing about on long sleek legs, trumpeting nervous whinnies. These weanlings and yearlings that traditionally show on Sunday evening, as well as Tuesday and Thursday performances, are this industry's future. Breeders, bloodline aficionados, or smart investors can examine the fleshand-blood product of genetic combinations, clearly stated not only by the announcer but in the horse show pro-

gram. The young horses we get to see may someday become World Champions, Equitation superstars, or not-to-be underrated - prolific breeding horses. Just by paying close attention, we give ourselves the opportunity to better our own breeding program or find a young prospect that can, in time, pay off largely with a comparatively small initial investment. But perhaps the most exciting draw to the young horse classes is wondering if what you are witnessing on the end of those leather leads will possibly make Saddlebred history. Watching these horses, I like to think that someday I will be able to say "I remember seeing [insert World

Champion's name here| show as a weanling in Freedom Hall!"

Some hold fast to the belief that youngsters who finish well as futurity colts lose their show ring "mojo" before they ever become significant performance horses. This is a myth that is rapidly becoming dispelled. One need only look closely at the show records of the 2010

World's Championship contenders to see that titled weanlings don't just lose their

talent as they mature, only to be stuffed away in a back pasture. Modern selective breeding has resulted in show horses that are not just flash-in-the-pan winners; many that earn titles as weanlings have come back as two and three-yearolds to prove their mettle as performance horses.

If you don't think it could happen, then just ask CHBlackberry Delight.

This towering gelding smote countless equine competitors, from the time he wore his baby plates, to the time he officially hung up his shoe shoes at one of the most memorable and tearful retirement ceremonies ever celebrated in Freedom Hall, Some lucky champions are given the privilege of saying goodbye in fittingly grand style, having the entire ring to themselves while adoring fans come to their feet in a final salute. These ceremonies are not to be missed at the Kentucky State Fair. If you've never seen one, know that they are all

Tissue Required Events, as even the most calloused audience member who may never have seen that particular horse will be moved to tears. They are elaborately planned events that don't just stop when the horse's saddle or harness is removed, a tradition for most

retirees. Normally after the honoree leaves the show ring for the last time,

the owners graciously host a party to celebrate that horse's career.

Between classes or during breaks, a walk around the coliseum is a must. If you haven't already purchased a spiral bound World's Championship Horse Show (WCHS) program, then get one. It's filled with all sorts of clever information that you will need at some point. If you see a horse showing and say to yourself, "Wow, who the heck is that?!" you simply refer to your show program's Numerical Index, where the horse's name and breeding is clearly represented. One can also find the names of all the elegant Equitation riders as well as a general Exhibitor's

Index, categorized by back numbers. The program is a great tool for the breeder, the interested buyer, or any serious audience member, not to mention it's a neato memento of your week. You'll usually find WCHS programs outside the show ring entrance ramp on a table right across from Howard Schatzberg's unparalleled photography.

History is all around you in Freedom Hall, but unfortunately, we don't always see what is in close proximity. I was chagrined to discover that I'd never done more than breeze by the Saddlebred Museum's display in the Cardinal Shop, located on the far end of the horse's entrance gate in Freedom

Hall. On display there in the window is an impressive historically rich collection of trophies, ribbons, and artwork. There ought to be a lot more hand prints and nose grease on the glass there than there is, because not enough visitors make it down to that end of the coliseum to witness these carefully preserved pieces of history. So this year when you need to stretch your legs or leave your seat to make a phone call, stroll down and take a closer look at the Museum's display; you'll be glad you did.

The Saddlebred Museum Gift Shop in the North Wing across from the popular Saddlebred Café also houses historically significant items, as well as unique



horsey gifts to bring home to your equine caretakers in thanks for watching your animals while you've whooped it up in Louisville for the week. Manager Lynn Morris is planning a book signing Thursday that will feature the newly updated coffee table book "The Saddlebred: America's Horse of Distinction." Says museum curator Kim Skipton, "This book is the Bible for American Saddlebred lovers and it's been out of print for many years now, so this is a wonderful opportunity for collectors." Well, Kim, save me a spot in line on Thursday!

The indoor vendors in the North Wing never cease to amaze with their variety and quality of products, ranging in everything from custom clothing and tack to high end artwork and jewelry. It is next to impossible to don shopping blinders - and why bother? This is the World's Championship Horse Show! Splurge on yourself. If you manage to make it through the vendors at Freedom Hall with your pocketbook unscathed, then I challenge you to investigate the shops awaiting your perusal at the Crowne Plaza Hotel right across the street from the fairgrounds. Many of the cream of the crop boutiques will be there, and if you browse long enough you will see many of the people in the Saddlebred industry at some point, either taking a moment from the whirling energy of Freedom Hall to browse, or just passing through the lobby on their way upstairs to collapse in a power nap.

The Crowne Plaza is also the place to go for the popular American Saddlebred Horse Association (ASHA) Youth Auction, which raises funds for ASHA Youth Scholarships. Last year's live auction boasted items like a finish-line boxed terrace for six at the Kentucky Derby, a private terrace for four at the Breeders' Cup, tickets for the sold out Taylor Swift concert, and even a week's stay at a beachfront condo in Florida. Always popular is the

WCHS poster signing by the previous year's World's Grand Championship winners. You get to take home a collector's poster, not to mention getting up close and personal with three people who accomplished what most of us can only dream of doing. Generally from 10 AM to 3 PM, this event offers a nice break from the horse show, with everything to offer from the silent auction and cash bar to the big money raffle drawing, the exact amount of which



will be teasingly withheld until the particulars of the event are finalized.

With the whirlwind schedule of the long week at Louisville, it's easy for us Saddlebred enthusiasts to overlook the

actual FAIR part of the event, but that would be a shame. If you are accompanied by a non-horse-digging spouse, or have children who can watch only a limited amount of horsies going round and round in circles, then unleash them on the grandeur of the Kentucky State Fair.

There is truly something for everyone. The South Wing B Lobby is the site of the Quilt Awards; even if you can't sew a button back onto your jods you'll appreciate the talent it takes for these complicated creations. On Friday, August 20 in the West Courtyard, the granddaddy of all Pumpkin Contests takes place, wherein giant mutant squash weighing more than your Park horse are on display. On your way to watch the dog herding demonstrations, stop in the Sivori Country Music tent to kick up your Tony Lamas. The livestock exhibitions are expansive and wonderful to behold, as you will find everything from exotic water fowl to meticulously groomed specialty breeds of cattle that look nothing like the ones from your college cow-tipping days (er,

I myself never participated in such malarkey...technically).

On the last day of the fair in the Broadbent Arena, a different form of equine athletes than we are accustomed

part of the event, but that

overlook the actual fair

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to put on a show in the Horse Pulling Contest. Picture the Arnold Schwarzeneggers of the equine world showing off their skills in a muscular display of brute strength and teamwork. There is much more to see and enjoy at the expansive grounds, and I haven't even mentioned all the glorious food. For example,

right inside Freedom Hall you can try the famous Lemon Shake Ups, or if it's a sweet tooth that needs attention, get thee to Ehrler's Ice Cream (I have it on authority from a 30-year attendee that the butter pecan is divine). Chocolate lovers will sniff

out the fudge to beat all fudges at Morgan's. And if your appetite is still searching for the Ultimate Fair Food, then try the pork chop sandwiches found at the far opposite

end of the hallway from the coffee stand. These sandwiches are like WCHS comfort food. They can make everything better, from a blown lead in Equitation, to a disappointing class exit due to a thrown,

non-salvageable horse shoe.

State fairs are known for great headlining acts in the grandstand, and Kentucky's is no exception; in fact, it's a leader. This year the lineup presently includes Tim McGraw, Sugarland, comedian Jeff Dunham, and Rascal Flatts - not too shabby, eh? Of course, the biggest music acts fall on the night that there will be nary a Saddlebred fan in the grandstand, because they are all dressed in their finery and perched on the edge of their seats in Freedom Hall. However, the concert goers must enjoy the amazing spectacle of a herd of bizarrely appointed golf carts screeching to a halt outside Stopher Walk, their elegantly clad occupants in ridiculous contrast to the balloon animals, Hawaiian leis, and various tacky-but-fun decorations distinguishing the individual carts. And we say that we get to people watch that week!

It can be the beginning of fame or the end of a reign. Saturday night inspires people to start riding again, or to finally

try driving. It is the place where many horses change hands of ownership, or where the last performance of their career is seen. And it can be the place to which young girls travel from Wisconsin and vow to become a breeder of this magnificent breed. In short, it's even better than the pork chop sandwiches.

Here are some things to keep in mind about Stake Night at Freedom Hall, Number

One, do NOT come looking like a slouch. Dress up, for Pete's sake. Gentlemen, leave your Dockers at home and suit up. Ladies, get out your Spanx, your most painful high heels, and suck up to someone hair-savvy enough to craft a good up-do, because the place is filled with the Saddlebred world's most beautiful creatures on two legs. Even so, the horses outshine us all. Number Two, don't assume that the occasional seathopping you've been doing all week is going to fly on Stake Night. Everyone shows up; the place is packed, and those aforementioned beautiful people can get quite ugly if you are "mistakenly" in their seat, so don't try to get sneaky. And Number Three, just try to soak it all in.

The classic sound of the Louisville Orchestra Brass Players, perched high above the arena entrance, adds to the

energy-charged atmosphere while attendees fill the arena seats. Sometime before the show begins, a Saddlebred promotional video is played on the screen overhead that is accompanied by the song "I Can Fly," and soft-hearted viewers like me all around the coliseum pull out their stash of tissues. Promptly at 7 PM the horn blower steps forth in the middle of the ring, dressed in a

red blazer, breeches, and top hat, and spreads a shiver of anticipation through the crowd from the bell of his trumpet. Whenever one of the three World's Grand Championships begin, audience members' eyes are riveted to the chute from which the athletes, one by one, enter the ring upon hearing their names called by the announcer's rich voice. I love this tradition, but a part of me wishes they still shone the spotlight on each horse as they burst into a darkened arena. Then again, I'm not the one in control of those powerhouses that might charge in from the chute only to spring aside in a lightening quick shy of that startling circle of moving light.

Everyone has their favorite, and like

every class, the crowd loudly encourages the horse that makes a blazing pass at the rack, or executes the perfect blend of power and elegance at the trot. It always seems to me that the multitude of faces becomes one living entity when a really exciting horse brings us all to our feet, draws our eyes to one coalesced point in the ring, and our voices raise in unison. This is one important thing that shouldn't be missed; when the earnest small town Saddlebred enthusiast that had to save for months to see their first WCHS is, for one shining moment, united with the glamorous bejeweled spectator who owns numerous horses on the green shavings. Stake Night is the night on which the horses bring us all together in our passion, enthusiasm, and joy.

The bittersweet aftermath of the World's Championship Horse Show comes quickly. I have learned to do my best not to linger around Freedom Hall after the Five-Gaited World's Grand Champion exits the ring, because outside awaits enormous machinery that comes into Freedom Hall and ruthlessly removes the beautiful green shavings, pushing the footing into ugly mountains of dirt, and filling the air with the acrid smell of diesel fuel. The sight is terribly depressing. So that would be the one thing I suggest you be sure to miss at the show.

At the beginning of the week, I love to sit in Freedom Hall long before the first horse enters the gate and take a private moment to breath in the intangible grandeur, with its immaculate

center ring, the brilliantly lit untouched green shavings, and the reminders of past champions ringing the arena in red letters. It is at once empowering and humbling, to be in such a place where dreams are made or broken, and champions step forth or step down. Perhaps it is because of this that Saddlebred enthusiasts streamline their focus straight into the coliseum for the majority of the week during the World's Championship

Horse Show. There is a magnetic pull that draws us to Louisville during the end of August, but the bonus is that our greatest horse show is surrounded by the boisterous, multiple facets of the Kentucky State Fair.

The two entities go hand in hand, really...one wouldn't be the same without the other. Rediscover the Kentucky State Fair during your trip to the 2010 World's Championship Horse Show. Oh, and I'll see you at the pork chop sandwich stand.







"It's just so civilized, like the old days."
"Oh no, here comes the rain."

"It seems so uptown."

There is no doubt the horse show classic known as the Rock Creek Horse Show is held in one of the most picturesque, natural settings in the country... the Rock Creek Riding Club in Louisville, Kentucky. There is also no doubt the show has enjoyed a resurgence in the past few years, winning multiple honors in spite of Mother Nature, the economy, changing times and the like.

The club was organized on April 21, 1929, although the first horse show, held for members only, did not take place until 1933. By 1937, it became a two-day event open to the public, with other stables invited to compete as well. This year's five-day show, the 73rd annual event, was held June 8-12 with more than 300 stalls rented, a far cry from that inaugural event many years ago when the show grounds were surrounded by potato fields far and wide. Now one cannot imagine the show without picturing the colorful tents, the stately old trees, the concession stands, vendor tents and the quaint and charming pre-Civil War house, now used as a clubhouse. Today it houses, among other things, a museum room filled with historic photos, mementos and other treasures from a bygone era, an era laden with the names of a veritable pantheon of Saddlebred tradition

Through the years, the Rock Creek Riding Club has been home to many Hall of Fame and World's Champion caliber trainers and instructors, including, among others, Helen and Charles Crabtree, Jim B. Robertson, Ed Teater, Charles Smith, Nancy and Frank McConnell, Sarah and

and excellence.

Rob Byers and Jimmy and Helen Robertson. Today Michelle McMahon and Chad Cole operate Signature Stables under the Rock Creek banner. In addition, the club claims many stellar individuals who have had a strong and important impact on Saddlebred history,

Becoming a member of Rock Creek is a distinction that is part of Louisville's riding heritage. Horse owners, riders and enthusiasts alike are welcome to join the club. Membership dues go to help preserve and maintain the club, which helps ensure its existence for generations to come. At one time the club grounds consisted of 37 acres positioned among the aforementioned potato fields. Hard to imagine that now, with the surrounding St. Matthews neighborhood considered one of Louisville's oldest and most settled. The bridle paths through Seneca and Cherokee Parks were the main draw, and are still in existence today.


The horse show and the club are inextricably linked throughout the years with the names of so many legendary horses it would be impossible to list them all. However, one thing is for certain. Winning a title at Rock Creek was, and still is, no small feat. The list of blue ribbon and tricolor winners throughout the past 73 years includes numerous World's Champion titleholders and stakes winners.

Most horse shows, at one time or another, experience an off year, whether it be due to weather (if it is one of those still taking place outdoors), conflicting



dates with a neighboring show, a particular judge or just a fluke. Rock Creek is no exception. It has had its shares of ups and downs, but with a revised format and a dedicated group of volunteers, it is once again one of the top shows in Kentucky. Years ago the horses were stabled for the duration of the week-long show, and every morning, railbirds abounded. Those early morning workouts were de rigeur and often led to horses changing ownership after a splendid workout. Nowadays, those morning workouts are the exception rather than the rule, for the majority of the horses are hauled in and out on the days they show. But stay tuned, because you never know when the next big star will come prancing down that back straightaway on a sparkling June morning and make your heart go pitter patter.

From that original one day event, the show eventually expanded to six days, went down to four and this year drew substantial crowds for five nights.

and Hope to the winning participants in the ladies classes during the Wednesday evening performance. Horses and Hope is a breast cancer initiative of the First Lady and the Kentucky Cancer Program. The goal is to work with the state's equine industry to identify new opportunities to provide breast cancer awareness, education, and early detection through screening and treatment referral, as well as to raise funds to sustain programs into the future. It was the First Lady's first foray to a Saddlebred show, and she expressed great interest in returning next year.

If one were of a mind to sip a bit of Kentucky's finest and have a smoke to boot, one would only need to stop by the Maker's Mark Bourbon and Cigar Lounge during the show. It was definitely a hit with the crowd, with proceeds going to Horses and Hope. The lounge was co-sponsored by local Louisville businesses Habitation and the Oxmoor Smoke Shoppe.

Saturday night brought renowned jockey Robby Albarado, his lovely wife Kimber and their children to watch the show and present a trophy. What class to choose for him other than one with silks and speed! It only seemed fitting and natural for the Kentucky Derby winner to present the trophy to Roadster Jackpot Champions Misdee Wrigley Miller and Trio Bolero G.

Instead of the traditional way of holding qualifying classes for the open championships, several years ago, Rock Creek opted for Open Jackpot Stakes, no qualifying necessary. Just roll in Saturday night, grab that prize and go home a winner! This year the big three included Merrill Murray and Walterway's What About Me as five-gaited champions; Time's Moneymaker and James Wallen in three-gaited, and Kathy Capsuto-Walker at the lines of Fine Harness champion, The DaVinci Code.

So next year when you are making out the show schedule, plug in Rock Creek during the first week in June and be a part of the 74th annual festivities. You won't be disappointed!

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The historic Rock Creek Riding Club has a rich and illustrious history, and has included some of the foremost names in the Saddlebred world. Here is some more background on a few of the distinguished horsemen and horsewomen who have been honored with induction into the Rock Creek Hall of Fame in recent years.

C.J. Cronan Jr. - 2008

He was a founding member of the Rock Creek Riding Club in 1929. C.J. Cronan Jr., better known as June, was Mr. Saddlebred. His devotion to Saddlebreds and many years' dedication as Executive Secretary of the American Saddle Horse Association enabled the breed and organization to progress to its present stature. He is credited with forming the first Saddlebred futurity program in 1927, which is the founda-

tion for more than 50 futurity programs across the country. Also, he was instrumental in the formation of the American Youth Horse Council in 1968. In addition to numerous award and honors, the ASHA named their prestigious Sportsmanship award in his honor. The Rock Creek Riding Club and Horse Show are proud to induct C.J. Cronan Jr. into the inaugural Hall of Fame.

Helen & Charles Crabtree — 2008

They were legends in their own time. Helen & Charlie Crabtree were the managers/trainers at Rock Creek from 1954 to 1957. They helped put the Rock Creek Riding Club on the map. This Hall of Fame husband and wife team were formidable competitors and would ultimately earn 75 World's Championship titles and instruct 22 National Saddle Seat Equitation Champions during their careers.

Helen was the foremost authority on saddle seat equitation and literally wrote the book on the subject. She developed the Crabtree Saddle, the first saddle designed specifically for equitation. She was the first woman to be named Horseperson of the Year in 1964. In addition, the UPHA renamed their Instructor of the Year Award in her honor.

Charlie was known as "Mr. Fine Harness" because of his unbelievable skills in the buggy, though he was equally superb in the saddle. He was instrumental in turning Crabtree Farms into one of the most influential breeding operations in saddle horse history and was rewarded in 2007 with induction into the Breeder's Hall of Fame.

Jim B. Robertson — 2008

Jim B. Robertson was manager/trainer of the Rock Creek Riding Club from 1959 to 1965. While at Rock Creek he imparted his own knowledge of saddle seat equitation to numerous riders, a tradition that he would carry on by instructing five riders to National saddle seat equitation titles. Jim B. was also an accomplished showman with four Fine Harness World's Grand Championships and a Three-Gaited World's Grand Championship, His numerous awards include UPHA Horseman of the Year in 1989 and 1992, induction into the UPHA Hall of Fame in 1990 and the World's Championship Horse Show Hall of Fame in 1992. His influences are still strong today through those who apprenticed under him.

Harold Morgeson — 2008

He is known as Mr. Rock Creek. Harold Morgeson has done more for the Rock Creek Riding Club and Horse Show than anyone in the Club's history. Not only was he the longest serving President in Club history, he was the long-time horse show chairman, who along with legendary horse show man-

ager Herman Miles, elevated the status of the Rock Creek Horse Show, which earned the show numerous horse show of the year awards. Harold was also instrumental in helping the Club rebuild and survive after a devastating fire in 1996. He might be best known as the best-dressed tractor driver in America ...who can forget his signature straw hat and suit?

Dorothy & John Lenore — 2008

Home is California, however their hearts are right here in the Bluegrass. The Lenores have been long time exhibitors and sponsors of the Rock Creek Horse Show, really for more than 30 years, stemming from the time when their youngest son, Jamie, was a champion equitation rider and later a top amateur exhibitor. The Lenores have continued to give unqualified support to Rock Creek. After the devastating fire in 1996, they were among the first to step up to help rebuild the club.

Sarah & Rob Byers — 2008

They have a special connection to Rock Creek that is truly unique. Rob and Sarah Byers met at Rock Creek while working for Frank and Nancy McConnell in the late 70's. They started their hugely successful Premier Stables at Rock Creek in 1980 and married a year later. They had their first World's Champion performance horse and World's Grand Champion equitation rider while at Rock Creek.

Rock Creek was the beginning of over 100 World's Champions trained by Rob and Sarah, including CHFace Card, twelve-time World's Champion CHMy Front Page Lady, Saddlebred Triple Crown Champion CHBoucheron, as well as numerous performance and equitation champions. Among their many awards, Rob and Sarah were winners of the 2003 ASHA Sportsmanship award, and the 2008 UPHA Horsepersons of the Year.

E.V. & Virginia Dulworth — 2009

E.V. and Virginia Dulworth began their long relationship with the Rock Creek Riding Club in 1962, when they took their daughter Jenny to Rock Creek to take lessons with Jane Howell Fleming. Daughters Jane and Joan would soon follow their sister Jenny to Rock Creek. Under the direction of legendary trainers Jim B. Robertson, Ed Teater and Charlie Smith, the Dulworth family would own many successful horses and ponies, including Holiday's Best Wishes, Sophia Van Cleve, CHAletha

Stonewall and Tres Chic.

E.V. Dulworth was a staunch supporter of the Rock Creek Riding Club and Horse Show. He, along with Carl Fischer, was responsible for giving Bill Munford his first big break managing the Rock Creek Horse Show. E.V. was on the board of the club for many years and club president in 1967 and 1968.

Virginia Dulworth was a longtime advisor to the Rock Creek Juniors, oversaw many club social activities and took her turn in the show ring driving her harness pony. She might be best known for penning the wonderful Rock Creek biography that we find in the horse show program every year.

Cornelia Serpell — 2009

Cornelia Serpell has been a supporter of the Rock Creek Horse Show for over 50 years, not only as a spectator, but also as a judge, steward, exhibitor and proud parent. Cornelia was known as a very fair and honest judge, who treated everyone well. She was always concerned for others and could always be depended on to get things done, but never for personal recognition. She might be best known for her work outside of the horse world, as she was the most single influential person in the history of Kentucky's mental health advocacy.

Herman Miles - 2009

Herman Miles is a Rock Creek legend. Many people know his name, whether it is by the street named in his honor in front of our clubhouse, or by the popular stick horse class that kicks off every Thursday night of our show. Herman was a former president of the Club and manager of the Rock Creek Horse Show for over 20 years. Under his leadership, the Rock Creek Horse Show continued to grow in importance as a major show, while consistently turning a profit. Herman also was an assistant manager at the World's Championship Horse Show and managed major shows in Florida and Oklahoma. In a fitting tribute, the prestigious UPHA Horse Show Manager of the Year award is named in his honor.

K.K. Gutridge — 2009

K.K. "Eddie" Gutridge was resident

trainer at the Rock Creek Riding Club in the 1940s. He was known as one of the most knowledgeable trainers and finest ground men in the business. He trained many champion Saddlebreds including Legal Tender, Ann Rutledge and CHKing of Revelry. After stops in Pennsylvania and New York, he returned to Rock Creek to help Jim B. Robertson with the great walk trot mare Tres Chic and gaited mare Princess Julia. He was helpful in the careers of many horsemen including Jack Nevitt, Ellis Waggoner and Frank McConnell, and was honored for his lifetime achievement with induction into the World's Championship Horse Show Hall of Fame in 1974.

Don Harris — 2010

Don Harris is among the most successful trainers in the history of our



breed. He has been showing horses at Rock Creek since the 1960s. He is perhaps best known for his achievements with World's Grand Champion Five-Gaited Saddlebred CHImperator (who he

showed at Rock Creek in 1981), but he also won the "Big Stake" at the World's Championship Horse Show on CHProtégé, won the World's Champion Five-Gaited Gelding title and many championships with the wildly popular CHGiddy-Up-Go (who won a record 7 championships at Rock Creek).

In addition to all of these career achievements, Don has won a record 13 Five-Gaited Championships at Rock Creek.

Jamie Donaldson was the photographer at the Rock Creek Horse Show spanning five decades. He and his late wife Shan were fixtures at major shows throughout the Southeast and Midwest. Jamie is now retired and spends his time on his new career, woodturning.







High Steppers Youth Club

This year CASHA has reorganized a youth club, the Colorado High Steppers. 



Bill Munford

Well known horse show manager William "Bill" Munford passed away on Friday, June 11, 2010, at the age of 77.

Munford was born in Taylor County, Kentucky, on September 28, 1932, son of the late William M. Munford, Sr., and Margaret Campbell Munford. He was a 1949 graduate of Campbellsville High School, received an Associate Science Degree from Campbellsville University, attended the University of Kentucky, was a 1954 graduate of Kentucky School of Mortuary Science, and was a licensed Funeral Director and Embalmer since 1955. He also served his country honorably in the United States Air Force.

Munford was a dedicated supporter of the American Saddlebred, and very involved in the industry. In addition to raising Saddlebreds on his 300 acre Taylor County Farm before selling it in 1979, he was also an accomplished horse show manager.

Since managing his first show at the Taylor County Fair in 1958, Munford had reached the pinnacle of success as a horse show manager, managing such shows as the Kentucky State Fair World's Championship Horse Show, American Quarter Horse World's Championship, Pin Oak Charity, Rock Creek, All American Horse World Exposition, Great American Horse Show, Tarheel Classic, St. Louis National Charity, Bonnie Blue National, Music City, and Hollywood Charity, to name a few.

In addition to serving as Manager of the Kentucky State Fair World's Championship Horse Show for 28 years, from 2001 on he served as Consultant and

Sponsor Coordinator for the show. Since 1966, he was a United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) Steward.

Among the honors Munford received throughout his career, some included, but are not limited to, a USEF Sportsmanship Award, United Professional Horseman's Association Associate Award, induction into the Kentucky State Fair Hall of Fame, ASHA Meritorious Service Award, and ASHA Wing Commander Medal.

Munford is preceded in death by his wife of nearly 50 years, Betty Jane Durham, who passed away on December 22, 2004. He was also preceded in death by his son, David Lynn Munford on June 4, 2010, and two brothers, Donnie R. Munford and Roger L. Munford.



University). After college, Nalley worked as a medical technologist and was a teacher in the elementary school Great Books program. In 1957, she and her husband, Joseph Richard Nalley, purchased and assumed operation of Louisville based Krauth Electric Company, Inc., an industrial electric equipment distributor and service provider. Upon her husband's passing in 1988, Nalley assumed the role of CEO, and continued to be actively involved in the business until her death. She was also a gifted artist and avid enthusiast of the performing arts.

Nalley is perhaps best known as an accomplished owner, breeder and exhibitor of American Saddlebred horses, having owned multiple World's and Reserve World's Championship horses throughout her tenure. In 2005, her horse, CHFive O'Clock, won the coveted Five-Gaited World's Grand Championship. Throughout her career in the Saddlebred industry, Nalley's horses have been trained by such revered horsemen and women as Don Harris, Redd Crabtree, Bill Wise, John & Renee Biggins, Nelson Green, Raymond & Lillian Shively, and Todd Miles. In 1980, renowned horsewoman Helen Crabtree rode Nalley's stallion, Lightspeed, as part of President Ronald Reagan's inaugural parade in Washington D.C.

Nalley rode horses all her life, including daily rides through Louisville's Iroquois Park, but did not personally ride in the show ring until 2000, at the age of 74, winning first place in her first competition at the May Classic Horse Show in Shelbyville, and ultimately winning a Reserve World's Championship that year. She was also a member of the United States Equestrian Federation, American Saddlebred Horse Association, Churchill Downs Turf Club, The Speed Art Museum Charter Collectors Group, The Pendennis Club, The Queens Daughters and Holy Spirit Church.

Nalley is preceded in death by her husband of 44 years, Joseph Richard Nalley, and her daughter, Mary Kim Nalley. She is survived by her daughter, Patricia L. Nalley; sons, J. Richard Nalley Jr. and Christopher M. Nalley; sister, Mary Elizabeth Reid; grandchildren, Joseph, Laura, Sandy and Thomas, and her great granddaughter, Jocelyn.

Rex Parkinson

Rex Parkinson, a longtime trainer of Saddlebreds, and United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) judge, passed away on Monday, June 21, at the age of 88.

Parkinson was born on October 15, 1921, in Peoria, Illinois, son of Fred and Mary Floy (Morrow) Parkinson.

Parkinson was a World War II veteran, having served in the U.S. Army Air Corps from October of 1942 through December of 1945. He was also a prominent trainer of American Saddlebreds, training such horses throughout his career as CHBurning Tree's Fantasy, CHTechnistar, CHRambling Stonewall, and many others.

In addition to training Saddlebreds, Parkinson trained Hackney Ponies, Roadster Horses, and Morgans. He served on the board of the United Professional Horseman's Association (UPHA) for 15 years, was a 1994 inductee into the UPHA Hall of Fame, and recipient of the organization's Distinguished Service Award.

Parkinson was also an inductee into the Kentucky State Fair Horse Show Hall of Fame, and was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the Mid-West Hackney Association and the American Hackney Horse Society. He served as President of the American Saddlebred Breeders Association of Illinois, as well as on the organization's board for many years.

Other boards on which Parkinson served include the Mid-West Hackney Association, Midwest Horse Show Association, Illinois State Fair Advisory Board, and American Road Horse and Pony Association, for which he also served as President. Parkinson also held a USEF judge's card for 45 years, and in 1998 received the Outstanding Judge's Career Award.

Parkinson is preceded in death by his parents, along with brothers Max Parkinson and Bob Parkinson, and sister, Jane Challacombe. He is survived by his wife of 58 years, Shirley Simcox, of Decatur, Illinois; daughter, Vicki Whitmer and her husband Bob, of Mt. Zion; brother, Stuart Parkinson and his wife Phyllis of Springfield, Illinois, step grandson, Bobby Whitmer and his wife

Stephanie; step great grandchildren, Katie and Jonathon Whitmer of Decatur; and several nieces and nephews.

Saddlebred Trainer Joe Elam passed away on Wednesday, July 14, at the age of 47. Elam, most recently working with Blue Willow Farm in Versailles, Kentucky, was the trainer of such notable Saddlebreds as World's Champions I'm Something Wicked, Buckwheat, Bewitching Jewel, My Main Man and The Tango Dancer; Reserve World's Champions Helen's Charm and I'm Mr. Blue; and World's Champion of Champions, Ninety-Eight Degrees.

Elam is survived by his eight-year-old son Alex, and his two sisters and one brother, all from North Carolina.



Improvements Made to My Trails, Regional Championships

In order to provide its members and non-members with access to as much information and features as possible, we'd like to tell you about the following recent additions and updates to the ASHA website.

Further improvements and refinements to online applications

Over time, we have been making constant tweaks and performance upgrades to the website applications such as My Media and My Trails. Users should notice that these applications are performing faster now.

My Trails

We just wanted to remind all our members that everyone can now log on to their membership section (under "Members" and then "My Membership" in the top red navigational bar) of the website and utilize the "My Trails" application to enter any and all trail riding info. Riders may use interactive maps to plot distances, track different horses ridden, and compare to other riders in this relatively new application. Here is a

quick recap on the details of My Trails.

To enter a trail ride, you will need the following information: 1) Horse ridden, 2) Location, 3) Date, and 4) Distance. To make the interface easy to use, we have implemented the following tools. All horses attached to your profile (those showing in "my horses") will automatically be available to enter trails. If you rode a horse not owned by you, we have a tool to find that horse in our database and use it for a trail entry. At this time, all horses must be registered Saddlebreds in our database. For date entry, we have a popout calendar that will allow you to choose any date in the past. For distance entry, we have the ability to use a Google map to plot your trail using waypoints, and the application will automatically fill in your distance once you complete the trail on the map. We hope these tools will make it as easy as possible on members to enter trails ridden.

Once a trail is recorded, it will appear on your My Trails section of the website. From here, you can easily see how many trails have been ridden total, miles ridden total, or broken down by each individual horse. If you'd like to see how you com-

pare to all other members, you can click on the "compare to other riders" link and you will be taken to a searchable and sortable list of all trails entered by every member. From here, if you have entered at least one trail, there will be a "find me" button, which will do exactly what it says: find you in the list of all entered trails. This will make it easy to compare how you are doing with the rest of the ASHA membership. There is also a generic search function to find other members, and the entire list is sortable by rider, total trails, or total miles.

Regional Championship data

We will soon have all Regional Championship Qualifying data up and visible on the website. This can be found under the "Competition" and then "Regional Championship" section of the website. With this database, users can check the eligibility of a horse for various regional championships in a matter of seconds. In order to ensure ease of use, the database is sortable by region / class, or searchable by horse name. For instance, once in a certain region and class, you can sort by Horse name, or Times Placed.

FORMS

Application for Registration: Use to apply for foal registration. With Breeder's Certificate form to certify date of stallion service to a specific mare; Transfer of Unregistered Horse form to transfer ownership of an unregistered foal; Breeder Designation form to allow owner of dam to assign a breeder; Blood-Typing/DNA Kit Order form to order a blood-typing or DNA kit or DNA Conversion.

Stallion Service Report: Use to record all mares bred to a stallion during a specific year's breeding season. Due on or before October 31 of breeding year. Automatic late fees (effective October 1, 2007) based on postmark (no exceptions): 1-10 days late: \$25, 11-20 days late: \$50, 21-30 days late: \$75, 31-60 days late: \$200, 61 days & over: \$300.

Transfer Report: Use to transfer ownership of a registered horse.

Transfer of Unregistered Horse: Use to transfer an unregistered horse; available as part of the Application for Registration.

Affidavit for Lost/Destroyed Certificate of Registration: Use to replace a lost or destroyed certificate.

Application for Certificate of Eligibility to Show: Permits someone other than the recorded owner to show a horse.

Request for Blood-Typing/DNA Kits: Use to obtain a kit; also available as part of the Application for Registration.

Membership Application: Use to apply for Association membership.

Statement of Signature Authority: Use to authorize a signature other than that of the recorded owner for Registry transactions.

Application for Exclusive Use of Farm Name: Required for exclusive use of farm name as prefix for horses' names.

Name Reservation Form; Use to reserve names.

Saddlebred Record Rules & Application Form: Use to apply to the Saddlebred Record program.

Saddlebred Select Rules & Application Form: Use to apply to the Saddlebred Select achievement program.

ASHA FEI Disciplines Year End Awards Application: Use to apply to the ASHA Year End Awards program.

Name Change Request Form: Use to change registered horse's name.

DATES TO REMEMBER

Listed below are various American Saddlebred Registry deadlines and other notable dates.

AUGUST

13 All weanlings must be DNA tested prior to showing in the ASR Kentucky or Kentucky Amateur Futurity, i.e., pending or conditional (including DNA testing) applications must be completed.

SEPTEMBER

15 ASR Two-Year-Old Sweepstakes yearling nominations due if not nominated by June 1. 25 Grace period deadline for ASR Two-Year-Old Sweepstakes nominations if not nominated by June 1.

OCTOBER

31 The owner or manager of a registered American Saddlebred stallion, which has been bred to any registered American Saddlebred mare(s) during the 2010 breeding season must submit a stallion service report on the required form to the American Saddlebred Registry no later than October 31, 2010.

NOVEMBER

30 Deadline for nominating stallions to ASR Grand National in order for all 2010 foals to be eligible for recording.

30 Deadline for recording 2010 foals to ASR Grand National.

DECEMBER

31 All 2010 foals must be registered (or application received in the ASR office) to maintain eligibility for ASR Futurities.

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Understanding the ASHA Nominating Committee Process

Do you know that two members of the ASHA Nominating committee are from the membership, and are nominated and voted on at the ASHA Annual Meeting? Have you ever attended an ASHA Annual Meeting? Have you read the section in the ASHA By-Laws spelling out the criteria for being nominated to be an ASHA director? These are the three questions I ask when questioned by a member about the nominating process. Almost without

exception, the answer to all three is "no." When this happens I am reminded of the Mark Twain quote "Get your facts first, and then you can distort them as much as you please."

One of the myths of the Saddlebred world is that the ASHA nominating committee is chosen behind closed door and the membership is locked out of the process. The process to make up a nominating committee has been the same since the 1980s, when Dr. Simon Fredericks (Houston, Texas) and a committee wrote the process, and the criteria a nominating committee must follow when recruiting future board members. It is beautifully written and has been changed minimally since it was first adopted; it has stood the test of time.

Each year at the ASHA Annual Meeting the membership nominates and votes on two people to represent them on the nominating committee. This year's representation is Janet Thompson (Columbia, Missouri) and Suzie Teater (Lexington, Kentucky). At its final Board of Directors meeting, ASHA Directors nominate and vote on two members of the committee and ASHA names the chairman. Those three people for 2010 are Betsy Boone (Concord, North Carolina) and Dr. Margaret McNeese (Houston, Texas), with Nelson Green (Lexington, Kentucky) serving as the chair of the committee.

The criteria for this committee are as follows: The Nominating Committee shall select a slate of six or more candidates for the Board of Directors from Senior Members of the Association who have been members for at least the three years preceding nomination.

The Nominating Committee must consider the following criteria in selecting the recommended slate of nominees:

- The geographical representation on the Board of Directors in relationship to the concentration of members in a given geographical area.
- Membership in horse associations in addition to the Association, such as USEF, UPHA, ASHA Charter Club, or ASHA Futurity.
- 3. The prospective nominee's level of participation in horse activities, such as whether the proposed nominee is an officer or director of a charter Club or futurity, activity in Association committees, Grand National, youth clubs or futurities, activity in USEF committees, membership on horse show committees; ownership or operation of a breeding, training, or riding lesson program; current service as a USEF judge or steward; current owner, breeder, or exhibitor of American Saddlebreds.
 - 4. The Nominating Committee should give special consid-

eration to the following attributes:

- A. Ten or more years' involvement in Saddlebred activities.
- B. High level of expertise in financial, organizational and communication skills or other areas needed by the Association
- C. Experience in innovative programs for American Saddlebreds.
- D. The financial ability, availability and the desire to attend Board and Committee meetings.

It is the discretion of the Nominating Committee to bring forth six or more nominees for each board seat that is term limited. At the time that Dr. Simon Fredericks was the Vice President of ASHA, as well as the Parliamentarian, he suggested to the Board of Directors that ASHA adopt the Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure. It did, and to this day that is the Parliamentary Code under which we operate.

Reasonable people can disagree about whether a single or multiple slate should be nominated for Board Seats. Sturgis gives some interesting "food for thought" on this subject, and is worth repeating here.

"In some organizations the belief persists that it is more democratic to have two or more nominees for each office, in order that there may be a contest. This belief is probably based on the fact that national and state governments have a twoparty political system, and therefore have a candidate from each party for each office. But, there is a growing tendency for nongovernmental organizations to nominate a single slate.

There are many capable members who may be persuaded to take the responsibility of an office or director seat, if they believe that the membership wishes them to do so, but often they will not engage in a contest with other members for the office.

Defeated candidates seldom choose to run again. Thus, the services of many good leaders may be lost to the organization because they are sacrificed to furnish a contest. Few organizations can afford this waste of good leadership. There is no particular democratic purpose served by nominating several members in order to defeat all but one of them."


This year's nominating committee is already hard at work, and I doubt that any of them are names not recognized by everyone reading this President's Message. Communicate with them if you desire to nominate a candidate, but first make sure your nominee fits the criteria. Come to the 2011 ASHA Annual Meeting and participate in the nomination and voting process for the two members on the committee from the membership. And most of all, understand that there is no hidden agenda within the Nominating Committee or the nominating process. It is the job of the nominating committee to present what they feel is the best slate, and at no time in the history of ASHA has this been more important than the present. Our country's economic situation has not spared equine breed organizations, and the climb up the hill to something that is close to normal is not for the faint of heart.

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
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
