
A Lovely Weekend in Lexington The 2009 ASHA Youth Conference By Sarah Hinds

Love was in the icy Lexington air on the weekend of February 14, 2009, but chocolate hearts and red roses were the last things on the minds of nearly 180 equine-obsessed youth who made the mass exodus to the Griffin Gate Marriott Resort on Newtown Pike (though the chocolate would have been nice!). The reason for this incredible gathering of kids from Arizona to New England was a common and reverberating love for the American Saddlebred.

The 2009 ASHA Youth Conference was more than just a free-for-all weekend in the Bluegrass State; it was a weekend of touring world famous Saddlebred farms, awarding accomplished youth clubs and junior members, reuniting with old friends, and making new ones. The eve of Valentine's Day began the weekend's festivities with the much anticipated pizza and dance party. Though the outside temperatures were frigid, the dancing, friendship, and Kentucky hospitality warmed the atmosphere of the already heated youth tent.

While the adults checked out the new exhibit at the American Saddlebred Museum, *Moments of Merit: Select Pieces of Saddlebred History*, ASHA Youth Members mingled about in the Griffin Gate lobby, viewing the impressive Youth Club scrapbooks on display, and perusing the 250 items of the ASHA Silent Auction. In the Youth tent, American Saddlebred International Youth Program (ASIYP) badges were completed, and various dance games were played until a dance instructor from Kentucky DanceSport – along with owner Maryta Montgomery, who by the way, also owns and shows Saddlebreds – took the dance floor with a dancing demonstration, followed by a group lesson for youth conference attendees. A new concept for this year, Kentucky DanceSport and Montgomery's presence

added a fun twist on the evening. Germaine Johnson, Youth Chair, was very pleased with the results of the party, saying "The Friday night activities were a big hit. The Saddlebred Youth are not only talented riders, but they can dance too!" ASHA Youth danced the night away, and as always, the Friday night Pizza and Dance party made for a relaxing evening after a tiring day of travel, and a strong beginning to the 2009 Youth Conference.

Early the following morning, Johnson, along with Brenda Newell – two main reasons the Youth Conference was a huge success – were bright eyed and bushy tailed (or so they seemed), preparing the youth tent for the Academy Awards Breakfast. By eight o'clock, the fantastic breakfast buffet was overtaken by hungry conference goers, some still half asleep, but more than ready for a day of Saddlebred excitement.

Before the festivities of the morning began, however, a slideshow presentation was conducted by Sarah Hinds, in honor of thirteen-year-old Frances Neunuebel. Frances, a fellow Saddlebred enthusiast and junior exhibitor, spent the past year battling cancer. In 2008, at the previous year's Youth Conference, attendees made supportive cards as she was just beginning her fight with the disease. One year, and many chemotherapy and radiation treatments later, Youth Conference goers watched a slideshow presentation highlighting the incredible year Frances had endured, and the trials and triumphs she experienced along the way, ultimately culminating in her victory over cancer. The immeasurable amount of support and encouragement Frances received from the Saddlebred community during her illness is no doubt what kept her going through the rough times. In addition to this, by overcoming her obstacles, Frances taught us the true definition of bravery.

With tears dried and composure regained, the focus turned to the Academy division. This is where it all begins, on seemingly dead-broke lesson horses, who, once in awhile, decide to be not so deadbroke. Red vests, helmets and martingales lead to bigger and better things, and only set the stage for what has the poten-

tial to be a lifetime involvement with Saddlebreds. An impressive number of riders were awarded bronze, silver, or gold medals according to points earned by showing and placing in 2008. An elite group of riders who went above and beyond the protocol of an Academy rider were presented with the Academy Master Medal Award. This award is earned by not only showing and placing in Academy classes, but by becoming more engaged in the ASHA Youth activities such as ASIYP, ride-a-thons, and other equine related community service or work experience. All of the Academy riders have much to be proud of, regardless of the color of medal they received, and have a great incentive to continue their hard work in the saddle!

There was just a bit of excitement as youth and chaperones mingled around the lobby after the Awards Breakfast, anxiously waiting to board the buses they had selected to ride the previous night. As adult members and trainers made their way to forums and meetings, anxious youth members finally boarded buses and began the long awaited 2009 excursion, overwhelmed with the excitement of the day's planned events.

Our tour began as the buses first lumbered down the drive of Tre and Emily Lee's Prospect Lane Farm. The white barn with green accents was only a prelude to the immaculate hallways of the barn's interior, and the talent of its equine occupants. Tre, who began his training career with John T. Jones, has come into his own in the Saddlebred industry, training such young stars such as WC The Starwalker (SA Cloverleaf The Wildwalker x Cloverleaf Sea Flower), WC A Silver Charm (Santana's Charm x R.R Silver Lady), WC Call Me Regal (^{CH}Call Me Ringo x New York's Crown Jewel) and the incredible, undefeated, two-time World's Champion, WC Paranormal (Deep Blue x Yarbrough's Strawberry Delight).

Tre began the day by presenting two talented and accomplished members of his show string: WC SA The Starwalker and Lady O'Lydia. Tre's training of his horses could easily be viewed as an art; carefully and patiently, he begins a horse's workout by simply walking the horse around, bending its body and working its head up gradually, allowing the horse to become happy in the bridle. The Starwalker, 2007 Three-Gaited 15.2 and Under World's Champion, owned by Harold Denton of Conroe, Texas, was the first to be presented. After the warm-up ritual, The Starwalker proved his trainer's methods to be worth the effort; the ten-year-old South African gelding proceeded to march squarely down the straightaways, with the trademark ele-

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gance shared by all of Tre's horses. Tre conveyed to the group what an important training tool the canter can be. With the lightest imaginable tension on the reins, Tre displayed The Starwalker's slow, rhythmic, in-place canter, which could easily have been mistaken for that of an equitation horse. Tre emphasized that the canter is a horse's natural gait, so any signs of lameness or issue with shoeing can usually be detected while a horse is cantering. He also expressed the importance of a horse's ability to trot squarely around a corner.

The second horse worked was the dainty light chestnut mare, Lady O'Lydia (Worthy's Prodigy x Lite Switch). This mare never backed an ear, and trotted off all fours with her chess piece head set and soft canter. Tre and Emily answered the many questions asked by those in attendance, and provided an overall educational and fascinating visit to Prospect Lane. Sincere thanks to the entire Prospect Lane staff for allowing the Youth Conference attendees to visit!

Clark and Sheila Clouse generously opened the doors of Clouse Stables to the Youth Conference and pulled out all the stops, presenting several of their exceptionally talented show string. Sheila led the tour, which began in the lounge of the immaculate barn, where folders containing history and photos of Clouse Stables were distributed to the mingling crowd for their perusal.

The second tour group of the morning witnessed first a powerful and exciting park-horse-turned-gaited-horse. This gelding had a neck and legs a mile long and he certainly knew where to put them, serving as a testament to Clark's talent in training gaited horses. Spooling Up (CHTop Spool x Dynamation) was presented next, a fiveyear-old, flaxen, big-going Park Pleasure gelding. His disposition and performance could cause some to mistake him for a horse twice his age. Justin Cowley brought the Clouse Stables tour to a grand conclusion by presenting his newly acquired Amateur Gentlemen's Five Gaited mount, Adrenaline Rush (Roseridge Heir x Worthy's Melody Game), a name that proved quite suitable for the five-year-old gelding. Justin had ridden Adrenaline Rush only

three times before his Youth Conference debut, but this was not evident from their exciting performance.

The Clouses rounded out their barn tour by awarding several door prizes, and answering the various questions of the awed Youth members. Another favorite was the infamous ^{CH}Colonel Hoss (Catalyst x Paragon's Lasting Impression), presented by Clark to a subsequent tour group.

All four buses reconvened around noon for the much anticipated ASHA Youth Awards Luncheon hosted by Melissa Moore's Sunrise Stables. Melissa's brand new barn set the stage for a boxed lunch, Juvenile Choice Awards, Youth Club Awards, and recognition for various other accomplished youth members.

Months of Melissa and Sandy Backer's tireless efforts culminated with the awarding of dozens of incredible door prizes to lucky ticket holders. Just a few of the prizes collected and provided by Sandy and Melissa included William Woods University backpacks and clothing, Saddlebred headbands, a certificate to a Stephens College summer camp, black and white advertisements in Show Ring Times, and tickets to the Shelby County Fair.

ASHA can be credited for the many awards made available to the motivated youth clubs and members. The ASHA Youth Award is given to accomplished 13 and under, and 14-17-year-olds who earn the most points for participating in activities such as ASIYP, Saddle Time, Youth Club involvement, and many other ASHA sponsored programs, as well as equine related work experience and community service. This year, Gabrielle Clauser of Monroe, Virginia won the 13 & Under division, and Hannah Vandeventer of Scottsdale, Arizona triumphed in the 14-17 division. The winners of the ASHA Youth Photo Contest were awarded engraved picture frames. The winner of the 13 and Under division was Michelle Porter of Phoenix, Arizona, with a photo titled "Double the Love." Sarah Hinds won the 14-17 division for the second

ACADEMY AWARDS PROGRAM



ASHA is proud to offer this unique program. All instructors, advisors and horse show committees are encouraged to promote academy classes in their areas. The development and appreciation of horsemanship and sportsmanship in our beginning Saddle Seat riders will develop skill and appreciation for the American Saddlebred that will last a lifetime.

Academy Awards Program Enrollment

ASHA membership is REQUIRED for participation in the Academy Awards program. For information on becoming a member, please contact ASHA at (859) 259-2742.

Definition of Academy Class

An academy class is any class offered in a local tournament in which two or more stables are participating, or any class designated "academy" at an open show. To be eligible, participants in these classes must be riding a horse designated as a "school" horse, a horse used REGULARLY in lesson program instruction. Acceptable attire is jodhpurs or dark pants, boots, and dress shirt or sweatshirt bearing stable logo. Riding suits are unacceptable. Hard hats are optional.

How Points Are Earned

point: Participation in an academy riding or driving class.
 point: Placing 2nd – 8th in an academy riding or driving class.
 points: Placing 1st in an academy riding or driving class.


Points will be tabulated throughout the show year, beginning October 1 and ending September 30 of the following year. An official point sheet verifying an individual's participation and placement in academy classes must be signed by BOTH the rider and the instructor or Youth Club advisor, and submitted to ASHA by October 31 of the award year.

To qualify for an award, a total of 15 points must be accumulated during a single show year in either juvenile (17 and under) or adult (18 and over) divisions. Points earned in one year may NOT be carried forward into a subsequent show year.

Awards

A bronze medallion will be awarded for earning 15 points in the first year of competition, a silver medallion for 15 points in the second year, and a gold for 15 points in each additional year. Only one medallion per year may be earned by an individual competitor.



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A S H A A C A D E M Y MASTER MEDAL AWARD

ASHA is proud to offer this award, which goes beyond the ASHA Academy Awards program. After participants in the Academy Awards Medal Program attain their first gold medal, they then have the option to continue with the Academy Awards program by earning gold medals on a yearly basis or enter the Academy Master Medal Awards Program, which encourages participation in promotion, education, and continued involvement with the American Saddlebred.

HOW POINTS ARE EARNED

Riding points are earned according to the rules of the Academy Awards Program. A list follows giving the options for activity points.

MASTER BRONZE:	20 riding points + 15 activity points
MASTER SILVER:	20 riding points + 20 activity points
MASTER GOLD:	20 riding points + 25 activity points

Activity points can be accumulated from the following list. All points must involve a combination of no less than 3 different activities total.

Participate in Junior/Adult judging or Showmanship at Halter – 5 points each Enter the ASHA Youth Photo Contest (entries received by November 30 of award year) - 5 points Give a speech to a Youth Club, organization, or class about the American Saddlebred – 5 points Volunteer at a horse show – 5 points (i.e. pass out ribbons, help stable or barn, assist other riders, concessions, etc.) Be a member of an ASHA Youth Club – 5 points Volunteer at an equine therapy riding program – 5 points Participate in an ASHA Youth/ASHA Youth Club activity - 5 points (i.e. assist with summer camp, assist with donation for annual ASHA Youth Auction at the Kentucky State Fair, etc.) Participate at the ASHA Annual Meeting and Youth Conference - 5 points Participate in ASHA Saddle Time Program Complete level 1-3-5 points Complete level 4-6 – 10 points Participate in ASHA International Youth Program Earn a Badge – 5 points Enter an ASIYP activity/horsemanship competition - 10 points Complete a level of ASIYP Level 1 – 5 points Level 2 – 10 points Level 3 – 15 points

Points will be tabulated throughout the show year, beginning October 1 and ending September 30 of the following year. An official point sheet verifying an individual's participation and placement in academy classes and activities must be signed by BOTH the rider and the instructor or Youth Club advisor, and submitted to ASHA by October 31 of the award year.

To qualify for an award, a total of 20 riding points, plus the required number of activity points must be accumulated during a single show year in either juvenile (17 and under) or adult (18 and over) divisions. Points earned in one year may NOT be carried forward into a subsequent show year.


