#### How it works

Partcipants keep track of the time they spend riding. Owning a horse is not a requirement to participate. Special Saddle Time awards will be given when you complete various hour levels. For example, riders will receive a patch and a lapel pin once 50 hours of riding has been completed; a patch and shirt when after 150 hours; a patch and a tote bag when once 200 hours is completed; and additional gifts and recognition as Saddle Time hours accumulate. Hours count in the following activities: trail riding, lessons, parades, drill team and non-USEF recognized events and shows (a 4-H show is a good example).

#### **Saddle Time Rules**

- Must be a current and active member of ASHA. Levels one through three do not have to be accumulated on American Saddlebreds.
- Levels four through six must be earned on registered American Saddlebreds.
- Time recorded begins upon ASHA's receipt of enrollment
- fee. There is no time limit as long as membership stays active. Hours are recorded on the official hours log report by the honor system. Hours required for each award are cumulative.
- Ownership of horse is not required.
- Hours will count in the following activities: trail riding, lessons, parades, drill teams and non-recognized events/shows.
- Hours will not count in the following activities: USEF recog-
- nized events/shows, competitive trail rides, endurance rides, driving, grooming and hot walking.

# ASHA YOUTH ACTIVITIES — Af the Warld's Champianship Harse Shaw

ASHA Golf Cart Decorating Contest This year we had 17 incredibly creative golf carts entered raising \$340 for the ASHA Youth Scholarship Fund. The Grand Champion Barn Entry was Jurassic Park by Equitate, LLC. and the Grand Champion Individual Entry was Polynesian Rose from the Horse's Name category submitted by Amy Cole from LeMaster Stable.

#### ASHA Junior Judging Contest

Once again the ASHA offered the ASHA Junior Judging Contest sponsored by the USEF, R.E. Fennell Company, and Andrea Hartmeyer Johns. There were three judging sessions offered this year with a total of 60 participants, the most Junior Judges we have ever had at the World's Championship Horse Show. The winner in the 14-20 Division was Mandy Bray from Burlington, Kentucky and the winner of the 13 and under division was Ella Sworm from Brighton, Michigan.

ASHA Youth to Youth Scavenger Hunt This year we offered the ASHA Youth opportunities to meet other youth by giving them Scavenger Hunt clues where they found the youth and received a prize from them. All completed lists were in a drawing for a fully stocked show caboodle. The winner was Kendall Kelledy from Wallen West Farm.

#### ASHA Barn Bingo

Once again, we offered Barn Bingo for two days during the week. The youth were given cards and went around to the barns to receive a sticker for the card and meet some of our Saddlebred trainers and owners. All completed cards were entered in a drawing for a fully stocked groom box sponsored by Doc Lane's Veterinary Pharmacy. The winner was Grace Parsons from Brenda Benner Stables.

ASHA Youth Scholarship Presentation Each year the American Saddlebred Horse Association recognizes its junior members age 21 and under on the basis of academic success, financial need, involvement with the American Saddlebred and the ASHA Youth Programs, and extracurricular activities including community service. The prupose of the scholarships is to encourage, support and recognize participation in all aspects of the American Saddlebred industry, as well as to strengthen the industry and breed through education. This year the ASHA presented three scholarships in the amount of \$5000 each. Our winners for 2018 are Elizabeth Brewer from Wade, NC; Emma Twombly from Carlsbad, CA, and Kaeli McCarty from Simpsonville, KY.

#### ASHA Photo Opp

This was the second year the ASHA had cut-outs of the past year's World's Grand Champions in the Saddlebred Center so youth and adults could have their picture made and have a memory from the show to take back home with them.

#### ASHA Junior Judging Clinic

New in the line-up of activities for the week, was the Junior Judging Clinic hosted by Betsy Boone from Concord, NC. Betsy went over what judges look for and what it's like being in the center ring judging the show. The youth had lots of questions and we all (adults included) learned a lot from her presentation.

#### Breakfast with Champions

Another new addition to our activities for the week, was the "Breakfast with Champions". The youth were invited to have an informal breakfast with past World's Grand Champion trainers and riders from past years. Merrill Murray, Debbie Foley, Don Harris and Nancy Leigh-Fisher were our guests and spoke to the youth about their first time getting a ribbon as a child and what it was like to win the Five-Gaited World's Championship at Louisville. This was a golden opportunity for the youth and they were full of questions. Before the event, all the youth were given ASHA Youth hats sponsored by Elizabeth Ghareeb and Ghareeb Equine Investments which the youth had the "Champions" sign for them!

#### World Champion Youth

Also new this year, we offered a high point award for the participants in our activities. Each activity was assigned points and we awarded a World Champion Youth and also a Reserve World Champion Youth.

Our Zu-Kru planned an outing to the Asha youth luncheon at Lexington Junior League horse show and the World's Championship Horse Show Stake night.


We also held a Halloween party at the barn and dressed up the horses and bobbed for apples, along with lots of other fun things!
