Suggestions for Yearbook Chapters:

- 1. History Briefly recount the history of your American Saddlebred Youth Club. When did your club start? List past activities and accomplishments, describing the fun you have had with Saddlebreds. Who are your leaders? What are the outstanding accomplishments of your members?
- 2. Membership Provide a brief autobiography and photograph of each club member, describing horse, and non-horse oriented activities. What level of horsemanship has each member achieved? In what school and community activities does each one participate?
- 3. Meetings and Programs Describe your meetings. How often do you meet? Where? When? What kind of things do you do? What have you learned?

- 4. Educational Activities In what educational activities has your club participated? Junior Judging, horse bowls, clinics, demonstrations, speakers?
- 5. Community Service How has your club served the community? Participating in a ride-a-thon, helping an underprivileged family, introducing inner city children to American Saddlebreds, working with handicapped children, or assisting in existing community service projects.
- 6. Fund Raising How do you raise money your club needs for projects? Garage sales, raffles, sponsoring trail rides or horse shows?
- 7. Promotions how does your club promote the American Saddlebred? Open barns, riding in parades, donating magazine subscriptions to libraries, supplying Saddlebreds for a judging contest?
